THE LEGISLATURE

A LADIES' DEGREE.

Continuing, Mr. Stewart dwelt on the justice of the claim for women's franchise and said that there was not one jot of evidence that the franchise granted to women in municipal affairs had had any detrimental effects. Reason, philosophy and experience gave no reason of any danger from granting the right of franchise to women. He had always found the ladies ready and willing to recognize all the rights of men and as an illustration, he had a letter from one of the ladies of the Suffrage Association, addressed to J. L. Stewart, M.L.A., and on reference to the Consolidated Statutes found that this Legislature had given power to a ladies college to grant the degree of M.L.A., which stood for "Mistress of Liberal Arts." He appreciated the generosity of the ladies in having conferred this degree on him, although he felt that he did not deserve such a favor. Was there a man in this Legislature who would take the right of franchise granted to women to vote in municipal elections? Experience had shown that the women deserved that right and that experience warranted hon. members to give them the franchise in provincial affairs. The suffrage movement was an upward one and progressed towards the light of the darkness. The women of the province were not ignorant of politics but could take an intelligent part in provincial elections. He was not a ladies man but he was not afraid of the votes of the women of Northumberland. If they were against him he would be willing to step down and out. The motion merely asked leave to present the bill and in all court-ly, even between man and man, he felt that the promoters should be permitted to have it introduced.

MR. TILLEY OPPOSED.

Mr. Tilley said that the question was one that had presented itself from year to year and it seemed to be pretty nearly in the same condition today as it was fifteen or twenty years ago. He had decided, after careful thought and consideration that it would be wise for him to speak in favor of the ladies.

Some Hon. Member—Hear! Hear! Mr. Tilley, continuing, said that his hon. friend from Carleton applauded too soon because he (Tilley) desired to speak in favor of from seventy-five to eighty per cent. of the women of New Brunswick who did not ask for the franchise. Those women were entitled to more consideration than the twenty per cent. who had with much ability and energy he would admit, come before this House and asked for the franchise, but if the eighty per cent. who opposed it were to be assembled they would pack this Assembly Chamber and the galleries and would form a line from the Parliament Buildings to the Queen Hotel. They were simply indifferent about the question of franchise but they trusted to their fathers and sons to speak against it on the floors of this House. He considered it somewhat of a slight to say that the men could not come to this Legislature and protect the interest and welfare of the women. It seemed to him that the interest of the women and children had always been considered first and the men afterwards and he felt that throughout Canada and the British Empire the interests of the women were well protected and safeguarded.

According to a brief, which one of the ladies had given him, there were several reasons put forward why women should vote. One was that women must obey the laws just as

men do. That all men and women should certainly obey the laws of the land. Another reason why the women felt they deserved franchise, was that the women paid taxes just as the men do, thus supporting the government, but the women did not pay taxes just as the men do, and very few of them paid taxes on their property. If the widows and spinsters who held property, were granted franchise, why should not the wives who held property be granted equal suffrage. Another reason advanced was that the women suffered from bad government. He would say that the women of the Province once did suffer from bad government, but that was not the case today. A fourth reason was that the mothers wanted to make their children's surroundings better. But where else could they improve the surroundings of the children than their proper place in the home. The brief contained other reasons, including the fact that over 5,000,000 women in the United States were wage earners and their health and that of future citizens was often endangered by evil working conditions, that could only be remedied by legislation. That, however, was hardly a substantial reason for granting the suffrage to women because the many labor unions saw to it that the interest of the wage workers were looked after. Hon. gentlemen were also told in the brief that women should vote because they were consumers, and consumers, needed fuller representation in politics. However the old of four or five years was a large consumer, and he felt that the interest of the consumers too could be well looked after by the men.

His Hon. friend had referred to the right granted to the women to vote in the Municipal and Civic election and he (Tilley) had no objection to that. His Hon. friend had also made a statement that the women should vote because the Provincial election in his (Munro's) county at least were pure and wholesome, and he (Tilley) was glad to learn that conditions in Carleton County were so superior to the rest of the Province.

If Hon. Members placed women on the same footing as the men from a political standpoint, they must naturally allow them to run for representatives of this House if the women were placed on the same level on a political basis the men could not look up to and tender them that respect which they deserve. He would say God bless the women and keep them in a position where the men can be proud of them and continue to raise their hats to them. He trusted that Hon. Members would vote against the motion and defeat it by such a substantial majority, as to convince his supporters that the consensus of opinion of this House was wholly against granting the franchise to women and that it would be utterly unavailing to continue to press for this franchise.

On the motion being put it was defeated by the following vote:

Mr. Murray, Mr. Guptill, Mr. Woods, Mr. Sipp, Mr. Baxter, Mr. Witzell, Mr. Stewart (Gloucester) Mr. Robit-chaud, Mr. Glasier, Mr. Dickson, (Kings), Mr. Dugal, Mr. Tilley, Mr. Melanson, Mr. Humphrey, Dr. Bour-quo, Mr. Carter, Mr. Sheridan, Mr. Culligan—21.

Hon. Mr. Flemming moved that when the House adjourned it stand adjourned until Monday afternoon, February 24th at three o'clock.

The House adjourned at 5.20 o'clock.

theirs constituents at once and test public opinion." (Liberal cheers.)

Mr. MacLean added that the premier should take until next week to consider this suggestion and then let the House know what he thought about it.

Mr. MacLean challenged the government to carry out its pre-election promise to the Nationalists, to repeal the existing naval service act. They dare not do it. As far as they dare go was to leave the training cruiser Niobe tied up in Halifax Harbor instead of going out on cruises with a full complement of enlisted Canadians in training for the Canadian navy. The Niobe is tied up to a wharf and that is the price Canada is paying for the alliance of the Conservatives and the Nationalists.

"I charge the government with cowardice in their administration of the Canadian naval service act."
