HEALTH OFFICER
TO ENTER CIVIC
POLITICAL FIELD

Ex-Ald. McKay States That He is Likely to be Candidate in King's Ward—
Political Situation Quiet

Health Officer Wm. McKay stated this morning that it is altogether likely that he would be a candidate for the office of alderman for King's Ward in the approaching civic election. To enter the civic political field it will be necessary for Ex-Ald. McKay to resign the office of Health Officer of Fredericton, to which he was appointed by the local Board of Health some months ago. His resignation is deemed necessary as the salary attached to the office is paid by the city although the appointment is not made by the City Council. There was a rumor yesterday to the effect that Ex-Ald. McKay would be in the field and his statement today makes that practically certain.

Few candidates have announced themselves up to the present time, but the week which will elapse before nomination day, Monday, March 3. Candidates supported by the Labor party and Business Men's party are playing a waiting game, each giving the other party a chance to move first.

Mr. Fred Ryan stated this morning that he had not decided whether or not he would be a candidate in Wellington Ward. Both the present aldermen for that ward, Ald. Michael Ryan and Ald. P. A. Guthrie have announced their retirement. Several names are mentioned in connection with the other wards.

REV. DR. McDONALD'S
RESIGNATION HAS
BEEN ACCEPTED

Gratuity of Five Hundred Dollars Presented to Him by Brunswick Street Baptist Congregation—To Take Rest

The resignation of Rev. Dr. J. H. MacDonald as pastor of the Brunswick Street Baptist Church was considered by that congregation at a special meeting held last night and was accepted. The congregation expressed its appreciation of the service rendered by the pastor by presenting him with a gratuity of five hundred dollars. To that gift many members of the church contributed as individuals and the church funds also were used.

The resignation of Rev. Dr. MacDonald goes into effect upon March 10. He intends to take a rest of one or two months' duration after giving up the pastoral duties in this city and before assuming those at the McPhail Memorial Church, Ottawa, to the pastorate of which he has been called.

A committee of the Brunswick Street Baptist Congregation has been appointed and will take up the matter of securing a successor to Rev. Dr. MacDonald and make arrangements for pulpit supply in the interim.

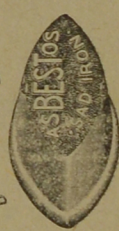
