BAPTISTS GATHER

AT DETROIT, MICH.

Detroit, Mich., May 21—The Bap-
tists are in possession of Detroit to-
day. They fill railway stations,
hotels, boarding houses and street
cars. Three thousand or more clergy-
men and laymen of the denomina-
tion had arrived in time for the open-
ing session of the Northern Baptist
Convention today. Many more dele-
gates are on the road and will
be here when the convention gets
fully under way. The convention
headquarters are located at the
Woodward Avenue Baptist Church.
Numerous other Baptist churches of
the city are to be used for the de-
partment conferences.

The proceedings of the convention
will continue for an entire week.

The sessions of today and tomorrow
have been allotted to the various in-
terests of the Foreign Mission So-
ciety. The principal subject of dis-
cussion will be the movement for the
advancement of missionary activities
for which a campaign is now on
to have every member of the Bap-
tist denomination contribute 10 cents
weekly to the cause.

Bible work, social science, colport-
age, chapel cars and Sunday School
lessons will be discussed at the ses-
sions of the Publication Society,
which are to be held Thursday even-
ing and Friday. The remaining days
of the convention will be taken up
with the annual meetings of the
Women's Home Mission Society, the
Historical Society and the Young
People's Society. The convention ses-
sion will be delivered Sunday morn-
ing by Rev. Lathan A. Crandall of
Minneapolis.

BOSTON OPERA CO.

HERE ON THURSDAY

"Fate must have destined me to be
a king," said M. Howard White the
basso of the Boston Opera Company,
who comes to the Opera House on
Thursday evening, May 22, as one of
the all-star company who will present
a condensed version of Gounod's
grand Opera "Faust", and a concert
program of unusual merit. "Faust"
is produced with costumes and scenery
while the concert division of the pro-
gram, including such masterpieces as
the quartette from "Rigoletto" and
the sextette from "Lucia di Lammer-
moor," will be sung in concert form.

He continued, "When I was a stud-
ent in Brown University, Providence,
my home town, by the way, I played
the Shakespearean roles of King
Henry VII., King Richard, King
Lear and the King of Denmark in
"Hamlet". Then I left to take up my
law career, and was admitted to the
bar in 1907, all the time realizing that
if any man had ever gone in direct op-
position to fate, I had. When I was
trying a case one day, I could hardly
control myself,—I wanted to sing,—
the passion possessed me. I went to
the smoking-room and, thinking my-
self alone, gave vent to my emotion
and sang. It chanced that I was over-
heard by one of the famous improv-
isateurs, who immediately declared that
I should be in grand opera. For years I
had been giving concerts, but that was
all.

"So I entered grand opera, and my
roles of importance have included
kings and princes more than anything
else. I have been to the King in
"Lohengrin," "Aida" and in "Tristan,"
while back in college days, I sang the
Pirate King in "The Pirates of Pen-
sance."

M. White has received more than fa-
vorable comment during the tour,
both for his "Plunkett" in "Martha",
and the inspiring concert numbers
which he sings.

DEATH AT NEW MARKET

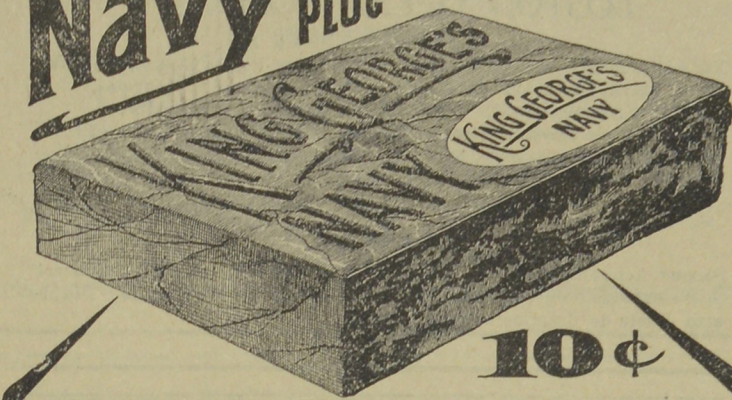
Mr. Henry Essensa, a well known

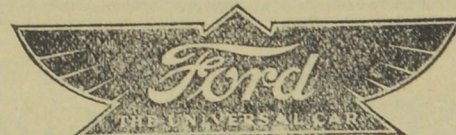
