In Chancery of New Jersey

In the matter of application of The Prudential Insurance Company of America for the acquirement of its capital stock for the benefit of its policyholders.

Order fixing hearing on Application for Appointment of Appraisers.

It appearing to the Court that The Prudential Insurance Company of America has heretofore filed its duly verified petition from which it appears that the said petitioner is a stock life insurance corporation, incorporated by the State of New Jersey and that the Board of Directors of said Company have determined that it would be conducive to the welfare of the corporation and in the interests of the policyholders thereof to change the corporation from a stock life insurance corporation to a mutual life insurance corporation and said corporation now applying to the Chancellor to appoint two or more disinterested persons to appraise the value of the capital stock of the said corporation and also to appoint one or more counsel to represent the policyholders before such appraisers and in such further proceedings as may be taken under or in pursuance of said petition.

It is, therefore, on this twenty-second day of April A. D. 1913, on motion of Edward D. Duffield, Solicitor of said petitioner, ORDERED that said application be heard by the Chancellor at the State House in the City of Trenton on the tenth day of June 1913, at ten thirty o'clock in the forenoon, or as soon thereafter as counsel can be heard, at which time and place the Chancellor will hear all parties in interest who may then appear.

It is further ordered that notice of such hearing shall be given to the Commissioner of Banking and Insurance of this State by serving a copy of this order upon him within fifteen days from the making thereof, and that notice of said application be given to the stockholders of said corporation by mailing a copy of this order to each of said stockholders at his post-office address, as the same appears upon the books of the said corporation, within fifteen days of the date hereof; and that notice of said application be given to the policyholders of the said corporation by publishing a copy of this order in one or more newspapers printed and published in the capital of each and every State of the United States in which the corporation does business and in a newspaper printed and published in the cities of Edmonton, Alberta; Victoria, British Columbia; Winnipeg, Manitoba; Fredericton, New Brunswick; Halifax, Nova Scotia; Toronto, Ontario; Quebec, Quebec and Regina, Saskatchewan in the Dominion of Canada, once a week for at least four weeks, the first publication to be made within fifteen days from the date hereof. In case no newspaper is published in the capital of said States of the United States, then said publication may be made in a newspaper having a general circulation within said States.

PRESBYTERIAN CONGRESS TO BE GREATEST ON RECORD

Four Thousand Ministers and Laymen are Called to Massey Hall, Toronto, on May 31 Next, When All Phases of the Church's Work Will be Discussed—Congress Extends Over Five Days

Toronto, May 27—The greatest gathering in Canada of men prominent in the Presbyterian Church will be that of the Pre-Assembly Congress, which opens in Massey Hall, here on May 31 inst. Delegates are to be present from the Maritime Provinces, from Ontario, Quebec, the Prairie Provinces, the Pacific Coast, and far-off China will be represented by Dr. Murdoch Mackenzie, who will speak to the 4,000 ministers and laymen on "China's Call." Big as Massey Hall is, overflow meetings will have to be held in Cooke's Church, which is one of the largest churches in the city.

To the Rev. Dr. D. G. McQueen, of Edmonton, Moderator of the General Assembly, falls the honor of delivering the first speech on Saturday afternoon. He will be followed by Mr. John Penman, of Paris, a layman who has contributed generously towards the financial side of the Congress.

Other speakers will be: Mr. J. Campbell White, New York; Prof. G. A. Ham Taylor, Chicago; Dr. Robert Johnston, Montreal; Mr. James Balfour, K. C., Regina; President Gandier, of Queen's University, Kingston; the Rev. John McNeill, of Cooke's Church, Toronto; President Falconer, of Toronto University; Mr. J. A. Macdonald, of the Toronto Globe; Mr. Matthew Parkins, Prof. R. Law, Dr. C. W. Gordon, (Ralph Connor), Winnipeg; the Rev. C. M. Wright, of Fort George, and the Rev. Dr. W. T. Herridge of Ottawa.

These men will deal with such questions as "Training for Service—by means of the Home, the Press, the Church, the College"; "The Church's Opportunity in Canada"; "Canada's Opportunity, Abroad"; "The Foreign Problem in Canada"; "The World's Situation"; the "Foreign Problem in the City"; the "Rural Problem"; "The Social Application of the Gospel"; "Evangelism"; "Temperance"; and "The Stewardship of Money."

The Rev. Dr. Hanson of Montreal will conduct the devotional exercises, which are being arranged by the local Laymen's Missionary Council, with Mr. G. Tower Ferguson, chairman, Mr. Frank Yeigh is chairman of the committee on halls and ushering and the Rev. T. Crawford Browne, of the reception committee. The Rev. A. E. Armstrong is in charge of the reporting of statistics, and the Rev. Dr. R. P. MacKay is at the head of the arrangement of a program and the formation of a policy.

The Congress closes on Wednesday, June 4, and is followed immediately by the General Assembly, which opens on Wednesday evening, in Massey Hall. The retiring Moderator will preach, followed by the election of the new Moderator. The Assembly will conclude its sittings the following Thursday. So that the joint meeting of the Congress and the Assembly will go down in history as one of the most remarkable religious conventions in the annals of Canada and of the world.

The one hundred thousand dollars required for the expenses and entertainment of the 4,000 delegates has been fully subscribed. This was the information supplied by the Rev. R. J. M. Glassford, secretary of the General Congress, and by the Rev. R. C. Tibbs, secretary of the Toronto Presbytery.

AIMS OF THE CONGRESS

The aims of the Congress are (1) to develop fellowship amongst all ministers of the Presbyterian Church; (2) to supply them with inspiration for constructive work; and (3) to enlarge their practical vision of the importance of missionary enterprise and how to carry out the work most efficiently.

The precise divisions of the delegates to the Congress, according to the Rev. Mr. Glassford, are: 3,200 general delegates, 300 representatives of the W. F. M. S., and 300 representatives of the W. H. M. S. To these must be added at least 200 others, who will be primarily delegates to the General Assembly, but who will come ahead to attend the Congress. Altogether, this brings the total number up to 4,000 delegates, which in themselves would make the population of a good-sized town. So that the Congress will be distinguished both in quality and quantity.

One of the chief problems of such a congress is the billeting of home accommodations for the delegates, but assured, both in the way of home provision for the 4,000 delegates is and other living expenses by the 44 congregations asked to provide for this. Other denominations have offered to take delegates, and to some extent this is being done.

The Presbytery of Toronto will supply a special guarantee expense fund for those delegates who, for instance, will be housed at Mimico, Weston and other suburbs, but who will not be able to get to temporary homes for luncheon and supper. These, it is estimated, will number about 1,000 people. Figuring each meal to cost 35c. each day's expense will amount to \$350, or, for a total of ten days, \$3,500. This is a local matter, and not a factor in the general guarantee fund, but as the churches are subscribing liberally already, it is plain that the 4,000 delegates will be entertained in a thoroughly satisfying manner.

RAILWAY MAIL CLERKS

Cincinnati, O., May 20—The National Association of Railway Mail Clerks, one of the oldest and most influential of organized labor bodies, began its annual convention in Cincinnati today. The convention will last until the end of the week. The annual reports show gratifying gains in membership and finances during the past year. A lively contest is on for the office of national secretary in succession to George A. Wood of Portsmouth, N. H., who is a candidate for re-election.
