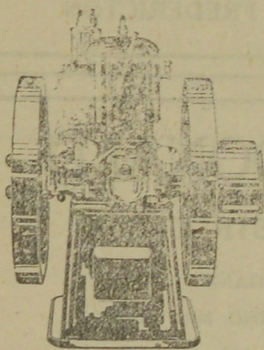

PETS LOST TO MARATHONS IN ONE-SIDED STRUGGLE

Score Was 11 to 4--Ingalls Had Nothing St. John Could Not Hit--Home-Run by Riley--Callahan Started Nice Double Play--Both Teams Fielded Well

The best of them have their off days and Fredericton had one yesterday, losing to the St. John Marathons 11 to 4. Fredericton could not get going at any stage. What rallies took place late in the game were quickly nipped by St. John's sharp fielding. Ingalls, who was in the box for the Pets, appeared to have nothing but a prayer. Anything he sent up was batted by the Greeks. The locals had nothing remotely resembling "pep" and were dead and listless at all stages.

St. John played in marked contrast being right in the game all the time. Woodbury was on the mound for the Greeks, and pitched good ball. He was hit for eight safe ones in contrast to the thirteen allowed by Ingalls.

The game had some bright features. In the seventh Callahan made everybody sit up by getting a hot one from Riley's bat with a one-handed stab and whipping it to first for a double play. In the fifth inning the big Master Workmen Tobacco scoreboard in centre-field, which has been a great convenience, proved that it could also be an inconvenience as it materially helped "Buff" Riley to a home-run when he hit the ball underneath it.

The batting of Fryor, Bien and Pinkerton, Riley's home run to centre-field, and Callahan's fielding were features. Desmond replaced Murphy as catcher for Fredericton in the eighth and Nolan replaced Black in right field for the Marathons in the same inning.

The Marathons scored in the first inning, O'Brien being passed, going to third on Pinkerton's single and scoring on Hughes' sacrifice fly. In the fourth they scored again, a base on balls, a sacrifice hit and Bien's two-bagger scoring Black. In the fifth the Greeks put the game on ice, scoring four times on two bases on balls, a home run and three singles. In the seventh they scored two more on Ingalls' error, three singles and a sacrifice. A double play, which began with a magnificent one-handed catch by Callahan, stopped further scoring in the eighth. Two singles, a passed ball, a sacrifice fly and a base on balls resulted in three more, which ended the scoring. Fredericton failed to get going till the sixth, to that time finding Woodbury for but one safe hit. In the sixth a two-bagger by Fryor opened things up and an error, a sacrifice and a single netted two runs.

In the seventh a base on balls, a sacrifice and one base hit, let in another. The Marathons tightened up however and their lead was too great for the best play to pull down.

In the last inning Fredericton made another spurt, an error, a single, and a two-bagger combining to produce another run.

UMPIRE HIT MERKLE ON HEAD WITH HIS MASK

Giants' Exhibition Game Ended in Row--Official Declared Game Forfeited to Zanesville Club

Zanesville, O., June 15—In a close and exciting exhibition game between the New York Nationals and the local Interstate League team the Giants won 5 to 4, although Umpire Frank Newhouse of the Interstate League declared the game forfeited to Zanesville, 9 to 0, following his fight with Merkle of the Giants.

Merkle in the eighth, objected to Newhouse's decision on a close play at first and made a pass at the umpire. Newhouse hit the New York first baseman on the head with his mask and brought blood from the gash. Newhouse ordered Merkle from the game, but he refused to go.

The umpire then forfeited the game to Zanesville, 9 to 0. Manager Marty Hogan of Zanesville ordered the game continued and he himself acted as umpire.
