GOVERNMENT TESTS.

Bulletins just issued by the Inland Revenue Department show that five specimens of sweet spirits of nitre gathered in different parts of New Brunswick were all genuine. Ten specimens of good cloves hardly showed so good a record. Five were normal, three were low in essential oil and two very low.

Miss Anderson sister of the Countess of Ashburnham has received a letter from her ladyship which contains the pleasant tidings that the Earl of Ashburnham and the Countess arrived safely at Liverpool and on June 7 took up their residence at Ashburnham Place the ancestral home of the Ashburnham family.

Miss Anderson had been expecting a cablegram from the Old Country as soon as the Earl and Countess arrived and not receiving it had felt some anxiety. The arrival of the letter however, has removed that.

The Earl and Countess while in London were at the Russell Hotel. On their arrival in England they were met by the earl's sister Lady Mary Bickerstaff and by his cousin Sir Laurence Ashburnham who is agent for the Ashburnham estates.

The voyage from Quebec to Liverpool by steamer Empress of Ireland was most pleasant. Sports were held during the voyage and the prizes were presented to the various winners by the countess. A copy of the daily paper printed on board the Empress was sent to Miss Anderson by the Countess, who also expressed a desire to be remembered to all her old friends in Fredericton.

The Earl and Countess expect to remain in England for a year, returning to Fredericton next summer for a visit.

BORINGS TO BE MADE FOR HIGHWAY BRIDGE PIERS

Work Will Begin To-morrow Preparatory to Sinking of Cofferdam--- Construction to Begin Shortly

The first step towards the reconstruction of the piers of the Fredericton-St. Mary's Bridge which were damaged by the ice-run in April will be taken either tomorrow of Wednesday when borings will be taken to ascertain the condition of the river-bottom and the amount of riprap which is about the base of the over-turned pier of the drawspan.

A crew of men under the direction of Mr. A. R. Armstrong, who is the local representative of Foundations Limited, the firm which has the contract for rebuilding the piers is at work today erecting a boiler and other apparatus on a scow preparatory to taking borings. The latter will number fourteen and it will take about one week to make them.

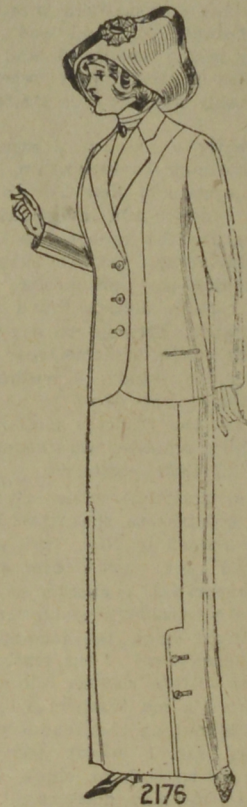
