

PEACE CONGRESS TO MEET AT ST. LOUIS

St. Louis, Mo., April 28-Advices received by the committee in charge of local arrangements indicate that the fourth American Peace Congress which is to hold forth in St. Louis the latter half of this week, will be the largest and most representative gathering of peace advocates ever held in the western world. Eighty separate organizations, all of which aim to bring about the substitution of arbitration for war in the settlement of international disputes, will participate in the congress. In addition to the delegates representing these societies, the participants will include numerous members of the United States Congress, governors of States, mayors of cities, foreign diplomats and other persons of prom-inence in public affairs.

The sessions of the congress will

begin Thursday and continue until the end of the week. 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
