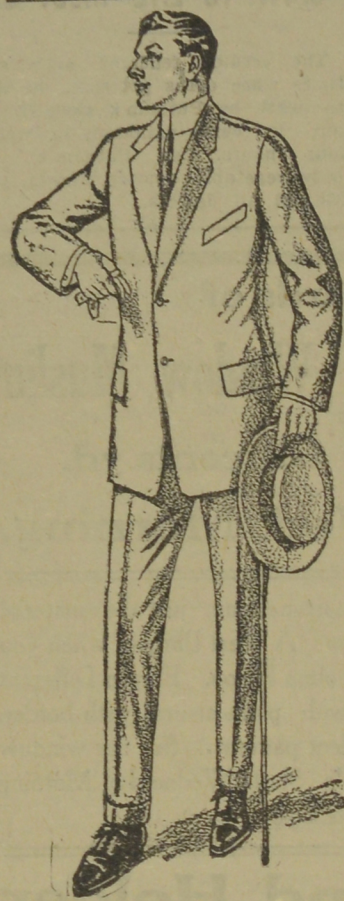

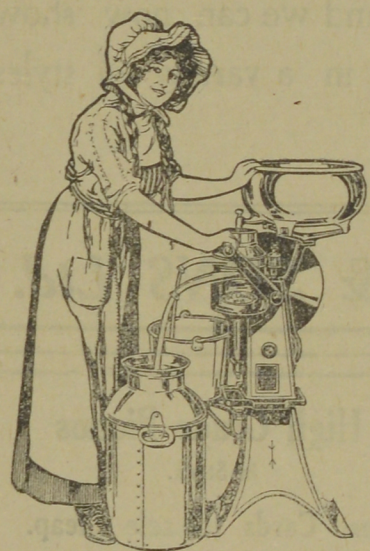

KILBANE AND DUNDEE FIGHT AT VERNON, CAL., TONIGHT

Featherweight Title Depends Largely
On Outcome of Tonight's Bout—
Dundee is Favorite in Contest

Johnny Dundee and Johnny Kilbane will fight for the featherweight title at Vernon, Cal., tonight.

The Boston Globe has the following on the bout:

"Though Dundee is touted strongly and by some picked to defeat Kilbane tomorrow night he has never shown anything in the ring to make the wise judges believe he will be the next featherweight champion.

Though announced as a Scotchman, Dundee is an Italian named Carrors, but who has been given a Scotch name by his Scotch manager.

If Kilbane lives up to the declaration he is making and wins from Dundee there will have to be another round robin of bouts to get a new featherweight champion. Kilbane says that it will be his last bout in that class, as he intends to box hereafter in the lightweight division and will go after the title in that class. If he does that will leave the featherweight title in the same position as the middle and welterweight ones are, without holders."

DUNDEE STRONGLY BACKED

Los Angeles, Cal., April 28—Eight followers of Los Angeles and vicinity are on edge in anticipation of the championship bout Johnny Kilbane vs. Johnny Dundee, which is to be staged tomorrow night at Vernon arena. While Kilbane, the present holder of the featherweight title, is a heavy favorite in the betting, there are many followers of the game who believe that Dundee will make a good showing against the little Cleveland fighter. That the two are generally expected to put up a fight well worth seeing is indicated by the fact that the entire house has been practically sold out for the contest. The two fighters concluded their work of preparation today and will rest until the gong calls them into the ring at 9.30 o'clock tomorrow night to start on their 20-round setto.

WALNUT HALL NOMINATES MANY IN KENTUCKY FUTURITY

Names Eighty—Nine Mares—Total
Number of Nominations is 1080
—Canada Sends 18

Lexington, Ky., April 17—The synopsis of the Kentucky Futurity for foals of this year, which closed with the Kentucky Trotting Horse Breeders' Association here April 1, shows that 1080 mares were nominated.

Considering the unfavorable breeding season this year, this figure represents an entry that is very gratifying, especially since the mares nominated represent the pick of the brood mares throughout the country.

The list this year is headed by L. V. Harkness, Walnut Hall Farm, near here, which has entered 89 of its blue-blooded matrons. The Patchen Wilkes Farm of Lexington is second with 82 nominations.

Empire City Farms, Cuba, N. Y., names 38, the next highest number. Allen Farm of Pittsfield, Mass., and Hudson River Farm of Poughkeepsie, N. Y., are tied for fourth place, each having nominated 30 mares.

Fifty-six nominations have entered five or more mares, their nominations totaling 713. The entire 1080 entries are distributed among 304 nominators.

Of the 31 States and Canada nominated, Kentucky leads with 378 nominations, while New York is second with 190, Massachusetts, 97; Illinois, 67; Pennsylvania, 58; Ohio, 55; Indiana, 35; California, 26, and Michigan, 22. Canada sends 18 and the remainder of the 31 send lesser number.

SPORTS OF ALL KINDS

Syracuse, N. Y., April 28—The Syracuse New York state league baseball club has purchased Rube Vickers, who pitched last season for the Baltimore team of the International league.

The longest losing streaks in the National League were: Louisville, 26 straight defeats in 1898; Pittsburg, 23, straight games 1890. In the American League—Boston, 20 straight games in 1906.

Manager Stallings, of the Boston Nationals is negotiating for Dick Rudolph, the pitcher once with the Giants and Al Shaw an outfielder, now with the Toronto Club of the International League.

Hunter Hill a well-known Texas League player and formerly in the American League was acquitted at Austin, Texas, after a trial of three days on a charge of murder for the killing of a negro named Battle. Hill's father and brother, also on trial were found not guilty. Battle was a tenant on the Hill farm and was shot in a dispute over crop payments.

Manager Kelley of the Indianapolis American Association Club, has released catchers Nig Clark and Charley Schmidt formerly American League to the Mobile Club of the Southern League.

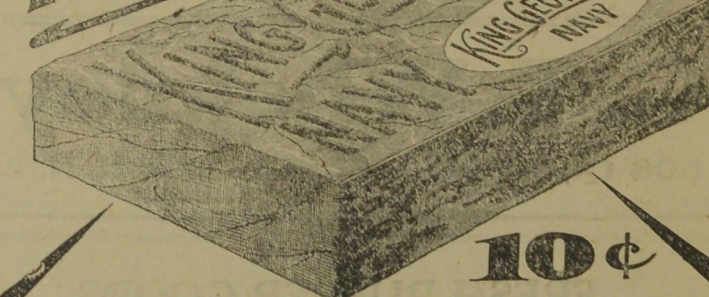
