A By-law to regulate the Keeping and Storage of Dynamite and other high power Explosives.

Be It Enacted by the Mayor, Alder W. S. HOOPER, men and Commonalty of the City of Fredericton as follows:—

1. No person shall have or keep, or store any dynamite, nitro-glycerine, giant powder or any other high-power explosive at any place or in or about any building within the fire and water limits of the City of Fredericton, as now or hereafter established by statutory enactment.
2. No person shall have or keep or store any dynamite, nitro-glycerine, giant powder, or any other high-power explosive, within the City of Fredericton, beyond the water and fire limits of said City, as now or hereafter established as aforesaid, without a license for that purpose being first obtained from the City Council, and no such license shall be granted by the City Council except for the storing and keeping of any such explosives in some safe and secure rifle bullet proof building or magazine constructed to the satisfaction of the Building and Fire Inspector of such other person as may be appointed by the City Council for that purpose.

3. No dynamite, nitro-glycerine, giant powder or other high power explosive shall be conveyed along or upon any street or highway of the City of Fredericton, except in packages or boxes distinctly and plainly labelled on the outside with the name of the explosive contained in any such package or box.

4. Any person convicted of a violation of any of the provisions of this By-Law shall be liable to a penalty of not less than fifty and not exceeding one hundred dollars for each such offence.

AUTO ACCIDENT RESULTED FATALLY

Walkerton, April 25—A fatal auto accident occurred near the village of Dunkeld, six miles from here, at 4 o'clock this afternoon, when a large touring car containing Messrs Robt. Hunter of Kincardine and Dan Connors of Eden Grove broke through a culvert which had been undermined during the recent rains. The car at the time was travelling at a fast rate and Connors was thrown headlong out of the car and was instantly killed, while Mr. Hunter was so seriously injured that little hope is entertained for his recovery. Mr. Hunter was brought to the Walkerton Hospital this evening.

The two men accompanied by Messrs W. J. McKeenan and Thomas Desmond of Eden Grove left Walkerville for Cargill about 3.30 but fortunately the latter were not in the car at the time of the accident having left it at Dunkeld a few minutes previously. Mr. Connors was proprietor of the Eden Grove Hotel, and Mr. Hunter is a member of the Hunter Bridge & Boiler Company at Kincardine.

CORRESPONDENCE

To the Editor of The Mail.

SIR:—In a recent issue of your excellent Journal, I notice that Mr. M. Hannon of Doaktown has favored the public with another characteristic effusion, regarding applicants for land under the Labor Act, and which also has some reference to myself. I have read the gentleman's several deliverances with pleasure, for although they contain some damaging statements against me, that injury is more than atoned for, by the pitte and satisfaction I feel when I remember that my native place, has at length produced and developed a man of Mr. Hannon's respectable abilities and high public spirit—a finished example of moral excellence the just man made perfect. In the midst of the more or less selfish scramble for personal advancement, it is reassuring to know that here and there is to be found a man whose unselfish motives and disinterestedness, has gained for him the just distinction of being called a public benefactor. Those if any, are not to be envied who claim that Mr. M. Hannon has an selfish motive, or interest to serve in his professed desire to see preserved in all its pristine beauty the penro virgility of a white birch grove. Nor would such a suspicion ever have gained credence but for the evil of early disposed persons, about certain unfortunate petty speculation of firewood which now "he is very often compelled to buy from these self styled owners."

Applicants for public lands under the Labor laws of the Province may now take courage for Mr. M. Hannon in his last letter has graciously promised to do all in his power to help them which of course means a great deal. As a rule they have generally been looked on as a class whose interests have not been very well safeguarded by any of the various administrations that have held power in the past. So much so has this been the case that thousands of our native sons have crossed the border to seek and go find in a foreign land those rights and privileges denied them at home. Some of these have gone so far away that their home is but a dream to them.

One need not go far afield to find the cause of this neglect on the part of the Governments. It is not because this class is not deserving of encouragement because if there is a man worthy of respect and assistance, it is the man who has the courage to shoulder his axe and go to the woods, and there hew out a home for himself in the forest.

The cause probably lies in another direction. These men though rich in faith as to the possibilities and future of our country are always poor in this world's goods. They have no influence at the polls. They have no money to swell corruption funds. They have no advocates to interview Governments and secure them special privileges and monopolies; Nor have they any representative to voice their sentiments in the Assembly. Therefore, because they are helpless they must remain hopeless. But now a brighter day for them has dawned.

Mr. M. Hannon has generously promised of his own good will and special favors, to do all in his power for these applicants, and all this notwithstanding the fact that these men are today asking the Government to dismiss him from the position of Labor Act Commissioner on the ground that he is not only unwilling to perform his duty to the applicants but incompetent to discharge it as well. Surely these applicants are not only ungrateful towards their benefactor but short sighted as well. What if Mr. M. Hannon becoming disgusted with such ingratitude should change his mind and swear in his righteous wrath that these men should not enter into his gracious favor. Thus they would lose the advantage of having a champion who is as willing as he is able to help them. How well the words of Strangford will apply here to Mr. Hannon's case.

"O perfidious friend or foe,
In brother, sister, husband, wife
Thou art the blackest drop of woe
That bubbles in the cup of life."
While I am anxious to approve of Mr. M. Hannon's conduct in defending the forest and the lumber industry, I am at a loss to understand how some men are so fearfully careful of one industry and so careless of another, equally important. It is well known that some of these champions of the forest wealth are, or have been in the past, in the habit of going to Cain's River in the fall to fish black salmon when the spawn are gushing out of them half as big as sparrow's eggs. But perhaps we ought to excuse the inconsistencies of great men. Such conduct is only the flash and flare of that fiery genius which "Ratepayer" betrays.

Of course the public will feel grateful to Mr. M. Hannon for the new information he gives us in his last letter. He says—"The settlement of the crown lands are not conducted on party principles." This is new; we thought otherwise because we had fallen victims of the buffetings of false philosophers. Of course we knew that the settlement of the public lands are not (a common man would say is not) conducted on Mr. M. Hannon's ideals of party principles, which apparently are to support a party while in power and abandon it when it falls. I will say

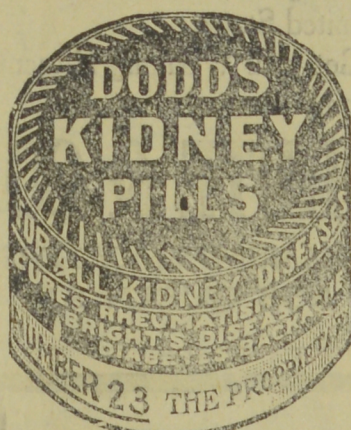
