## ABSOLUTE DIVORCE GRANTED IN TWO CASES BY COURT

Infidelity Ground for Divorce in Cases of Prince vs. Prince and Johnson vs. Johnson

Absolute divorce was granted by His Honor Judge McKeown in the Divorce Court this morning in two cases, one of which was from this city. The cases were before the Divorce Court at February sittings. They were Susan B. Prince vs Harold W. Prince and Burton Arthur Johnson vs Verna Elsie Johnson. Neither were defended.

In the case of Prince vs Prince evidence showed that the defendant Harold W. Prince, had been married to Susan McCutcheon of Fredericton January 1, 1909, in St. John, the ceremony being performed by Rev. Gideon Swim. Infidelity on the part of the husband was sworn to by the wife and other witnesses. The defendant went from this city to St. John some time ago.

In the case of Johnson vs Johnson action was brought by the husband on grounds of infidelity. The marriage was performed February 13, 1908, at Newcastle by Rev. H. T. Cousins. The maiden name of the defendant was Cameron. The greater part of the evidence in this case was taken in Boston under commission. It was shown by this evidence that the defendant was then living in Boston with a man named Slate. Mr. P. A. Guthrie was proctor in the Prince suit and Mr. M. E. Albert Reilly of Moncton, in the other.

## COLD WEATHER UP RIVER CHECKS RISE IN WATER

River Here at Highest Point Reached This Season—Fairly Heavy Run of Bank-Logs at Springhill Monday

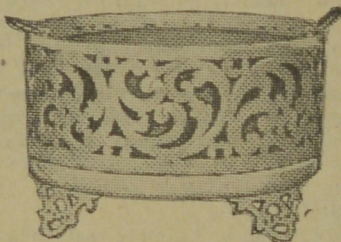
The river now is as about as high as it was when the ice ran out April 1. It rose about ten inches last night but today the rate has been slower. Reports from up river are to the effect that there has been a big rise in the water but that it is at a standstill today. Van Buren reports a snow squall this morning accompanied by a drop in the temperature.

Logs are coming into the booms but not in any great quantity and no heavy run of logs is reported up river.

There was quite a run of bank logs at Springhill yesterday but today arrivals were light. Prices do not show any change being about \$14 for
