



MODEL CITY FOR
SOUTH AMERICA

New York, Jan. 27.—The thousands
of discontented souls throughout the
United States and Canada who have
become interested in the Order of
Right Fellows and its beautiful
scheme for the establishment of a
Utopia on a great tract of land in
Brazil, \$10 down and \$1,000 in mon-
thly installments, will be doubly in-
terested today to learn that Chief
Post-office Inspector Warren W. Dick-
son and Jacintho Ferreira de Cunha,
the Brazilian consul general, are also
interested. So much so, in fact, that
the latter pair have asked the offi-
cers of this extraordinary enterprise
to make a full explanation of their
object.

Inspector Dickson's chief interest
lies in the use of the mails for the
collection of subscriptions to the fund
on which the wonderful dream city
of Nueva Esperanza ("New Hope")
is to be erected on the banks of the
Rio de la Plata, eighty odd miles
from Rio de Janeiro. The consul
general wants to know how it hap-
pened that his government should
have made the grant of 24,000 acres
claimed by the promoters of the
scheme without his knowing anything
about it, it being customary for gov-
ernments the world over to acquaint
their foreign representatives with
little things like that.

There are six officers of the Right

minister: President Dr. John Alber-
tus, a student of co-operative colonies;
Vice-president Mrs. Marie Rob-
inson Wright, a writer of books of
travel, including several about
South America; Chairman Rev. Dr.

and organizer, Dr. John Vetter, the

FORMER ALBERT MAN
DEAD IN THE WEST

Hopewell Hill, Jan. 27.—Intelligence
has been received here of the death
at Anoka, Minn., of Samuel P. Star-
ratt, a native of Hopewell, who will
still be remembered by the older res-
idents of this place. Mr. Starratt
passed away at his home in Anoka,
on January 13, after a short illness
of paralysis. Blind for more than
fifty years, the life of the deceased
was remarkable for courage and op-
timism, and was characterized by a
strong and abiding faith and a broad
sympathy for others, that won him
the respect and admiration of all.
Mr. Starratt was born in Caledonia,
Albert County, on September 27,
1835, and when twenty-one years of
age, went to the western states.
When the American civil war broke
out, he enlisted in a company of the
1st Michigan Regiment. In the
second battle of Bull Run, June 27,
1862, Mr. Starratt was shot through
the head, the bullet passing in at
one side and out the other, severing
the optic nerve, and causing instant
and total blindness. The wounded
man was left for dead on the field,
and remained for twenty-four hours
without food or shelter. Shortly
after the wounded soldier fell into
the hands of the Confederates and
was taken to Libbey prison. There
he had no medical attention but his
wound healed within thirty days,
practically without pain. On the
11th of July of the same year he and
his comrades were released through
exchange, and the following month
he received his discharge from the
army on account of his blindness and
returned to Minnesota, where the
following year he was married to
Miss Jane L. Jordan, to whom he
had been betrothed before enlisting.
Their home has been in Anoka since
1866. Mr. Starratt is survived by
his wife and three daughters, whose
life-long care and devotion made his
great affliction as little of a burden
as it was possible to be. Of the
large family of brothers and sisters
of the deceased, two are living, Mrs.
Calvin Smith and Mrs. Carter Smith,
now residing on the Pacific Coast.
The others who are passed away,
were John, Joseph, Handley, Man-
ning and William S. Starratt, and
Mrs. Judah Wells. Samuel B. Star-
ratt of Hillsboro, Albert County, is
a nephew of the deceased, other
nephews being C. S. Starratt, ac-
countant at the Dorchester Peniten-
tiary, S. J. Starratt of New York,
W. W. P. Starratt of Moncton, Cole-
man Starratt of Elgin, and Samuel
Starratt, living in the States.



MISSISSIPPI WOMAN
CHARGED WITH MURDER

Brookhaven, Miss., Jan. 27.—The
grand jury today took up the case
of Mrs. Mattie Clements, who two
weeks ago shot and killed John Mul-
len for alleged intimacy with her
young daughter. The tragedy oc-
curred at the home of Mrs. Clements,
who is a widow. The woman claims
self-defense, alleging that she shot
Mullen only after he had drawn a
knife and threatened to kill her. Her
statements in this particular were
born out by the testimony of the
sheriff, who found a knife tightly
clamped in the dead man's hand when
he arrived at the scene of the trag-
edy in response to a telephone call
from Mrs. Clements. Public sym-
pathy appears to be strongly on the
side of the widow, who has been at
liberty on a small bond since the
killing.

No charges are made by the post
office authorities or by the Brazilian
consul general. They merely have in-
stituted an investigation. The offi-
cers of the project claim to have
taken in no money as yet, merely
letters from thousands of persons ex-
pressing interest in the scheme for
establishing a model city and co-op-
erative colony in Brazil.
The circulars distributed by the
promoters call for a \$10 initiation
fee into the Order of Right Fellows
and monthly payments towards the
\$1,000 that each member of the pro-
posed colony must raise before he or
she can enjoy its prospective bless-
ings.

PLAYRIGHT DEFENDANT
IN DIVORCE SUIT

New York, Jan. 27.—Considerable
interest is manifested in literary and
theatrical circles in the suit for di-
vorce brought by Mrs. Realla Abel
Armstrong against her husband, Paul
Armstrong, the well known play-
wright, which came up in court to-
day for hearing. The present action
is the second of its kind brought by
Mrs. Armstrong, the first having
been filed in 1910 in Annapolis, her
home city. The first suit was with-
drawn a few months later and it was
rumored that the Armstrongs had
become reconciled. When the present
suit was entered here last fall the
papers were filed secretly, access to
them refused and all parties declined
to make any statement.

The Armstrongs were married
about fifteen years ago in London.
They lived in Annapolis for a time,
where Mrs. Armstrong, as a talented
artist and a member of the fashio-
nable Anne Arundel Hunt Club, held
a desirable position in society. After
her first divorce action she moved to
New York. The couple have three
children, who live with their mother.

NOTICE OF LEGISLATION

The City of Fredericton will pre-
sent at the approaching Session of
the Legislative Assembly of New
Brunswick the following bills for en-
actment:

(1) A Bill authorizing the City to
grant certain concessions to the Pal-
mer-McLellan Company, Limited, and
to fix the valuation of the property
of Frasers Limited in this City for
taxation purposes.

(2) A Bill to authorize the issue
of Debentures for the erection of a
Fire Station, a Police Station, for
the purchase of Queen's Park and
for the further construction of Per-
manent Street Pavements, not ex-
ceeding in the whole the sum of
Forty-five Thousand Dollars (\$45,000).

(3) A Bill to provide for lighting
by electricity the Fredericton and
St. Mary's Highway Bridge.
