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**OPINION ON THE
MONEY MARKET**

The Financial Times still believes that there are two dominant factors governing the present extraordinary money market. First of these is the contingency of a renewal of delicate Balkan conditions, which might be followed by further European liquidation of international securities. It is felt on all sides that though the great powers are working for peace they all want peace on their own terms, and that being a practical impossibility, there may again be a showing of teeth, and whether such a demonstration is diplomatic bluff or dead earnest representation, the results so far as the security markets are concerned will be much the same.

"We also believe that the banks have set their face against the nation-wide speculation in lands and even against business extensions. It is quite evident that the banks are determined to bring general credits to a more healthy foundation—that is to say, they may be quite satisfied that credits are not unduly strained but realize that under any pressure from outside, or inside for that matter, the situation might easily change to our disadvantage. There is no question about the basic strength of Canadian position, speaking generally, but it would be too much to expect immediate underlying strength following such a long period of speculative activity in all lines."

**MICHIGAN'S GOVERNOR
TO BE SWORN IN**

Lansing, Mich., Dec. 31—The advance guard of what promises to be the biggest crush of visitors ever seen here has arrived to witness the swearing in of Woodbridge N. Ferris, the first Democratic governor elected in Michigan in twenty-two years. Elaborate preparations have been made for tomorrow's ceremonies, and all State and city buildings and many business houses and residences are profusely decorated. It is expected that by tomorrow noon 20,000 strangers will be in the capital. Special trains have been chartered to bring large parties of Democrats from Detroit, Grand Rapids and other points.

Mr. McLeod was served with notice of trial before leaving on his trip and upon and after such service had no communication whatever with me in reference to the trial of the case nor had any person for him.

Neither is it true that the defendant stated that he was ready to go on with the trial in January and had made his plans accordingly as he had engaged counsel to act for him in the absence of Mr. McLeod; if by that statement it is intended to be inferred that any such remark was addressed to me or in an audible voice to any other person in my presence.

**MICHIGAN LEGISLATURE
OPENS THIS WEEK**

Lansing, Mich., Dec. 31—Members of the Michigan legislature are rounding up in the capital in anticipation of the opening of the biennial session of that body tomorrow. The prediction is made that the session will be one of the most eventful in the history of the State. No one knows just what Woodbridge N. Ferris, the Democratic governor-elect will advocate in his inaugural message tomorrow, it is generally predicted that Chase S. Osborne, the retiring governor, will speak out vigorously to the legislature in his farewell address.

Matters of much weight are to be brought before the new legislature, chief among which are amendments to the Workmen's Compensation Act, changes in the system of taxation, conservation measures, and the simplification of the primary and election laws. Early in the session the legislature will be called upon to elect a United States senator, but little interest attaches to the election in November assures the re-election of Senator William Alden Smith.

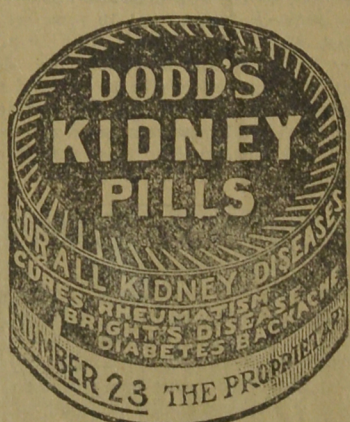
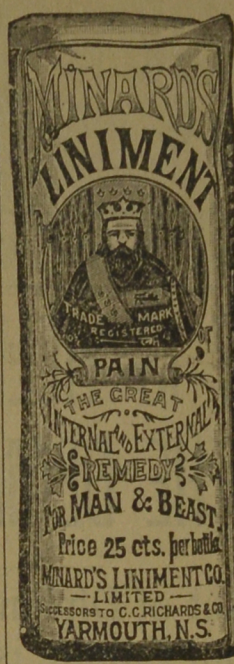

**BAY STATE LEGISLATURE
TO CHOOSE A SENATOR**

Boston, Mass., Dec. 31—The annual session of the Massachusetts legislature, at which a United States senator will be chosen and during which action will be taken on many matters of state importance, will be convened at noon tomorrow. The contest for the seat of Senator W. Murray Crane is attracting much attention. There are half a dozen aspirants for the toga, representing a wide range of political views. The Republican majority on joint ballot is about forty and presumably only a Republican will be chosen. Samuel W. McCall, representative in Congress, and Curtis Guild Jr., former governor of Massachusetts and at present the United States ambassador at St. Petersburg, are generally regarded as the strongest possibilities for the senatorship. Other active candidates in the field are Congressman John W. Weeks and William B. Plunkett, the latter representing himself as the choice of the western part of the state.

Washington, D. C., Dec. 31—After more than forty years' service in the army, Col. Edwin P. Andrus of the cavalry, was placed on the retired list today on his own request. Col. Andrus is from New York and was graduated from West Point in 1875. His entire service has been in the cavalry army. Recently he has been attached to the 11th Cavalry at Fort Oglethorpe, Georgia.
