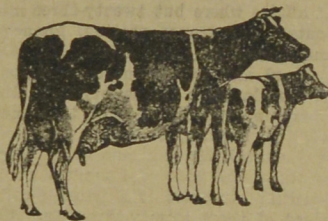

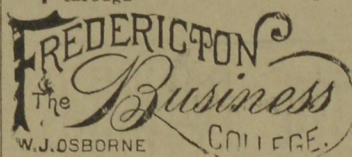

be quite a farce.

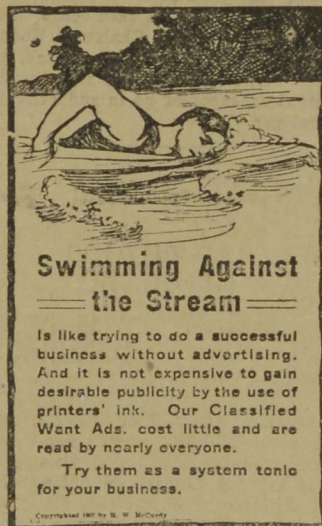
Mr. Geo. Mazerall has started

BURNS WROTE SONGS

THAT WILL NEVER DIE

Saturday marked the 154th anniver-
sary of the birth of Robert Burns,
Scotland's peasant poet.

As time rolls on, as year succeeds
year, Burns' name becomes dearer to
the hearts of his countrymen. Where-
ever Scotchmen are, the world over,
they gather together to sing the
songs of the man who saved their
country to them: who compelled
Scotchmen to retain their identity;

Who wrote songs that will never die.
Where is the song that has lived
like "Auld Lang Syne?" Where is the
national anthem that can compare
with "Scots Wha Hae?" Where is the
love song with the pathos of "High-
land Mary?" or the love song for
the old couple like "John Anderson
My Jo."

Burns' random sayings have be-
come world wide quotations: "Oh
would some power the gifle gie us,
To see ourselves as ithers see us,"
applies equally as well today as it
did in days of yore, likewise "Man's
inhumanity to man." To understand
his democratic nature read "A Man's
a Man for a That."

But best of all, if you would know
the good that was in the man, then
turn to "The Cottar's Saturday
Night." John Stuart Blackie said,
"If Burns had never written another
poem this alone would have made his
name immortal." The poet's de-
scription of his own family conduct-
ing family worship, is another to
us enough to make the so-called
Christians of the present day blush
with shame. When he tells us "Then
kneeling down to Heaven's Eternal
King, the Saint, the Father, and the
Husband prays," it is "From scenes
like these auld Scotia's grandeur
springs, that makes her loved at
home revered abroad."

It is generally conceded that of
Burns' many poems, "Tam O' Shan-
ter" is the masterpiece, that is, from
a poetical standpoint. Here we have
a tale, with the sublime blending
into the ridiculous. Why do thou-
sands annually visit Alloways auld
haunted kirk yard? Is it to view the
ruins? No, it is to see the little
window that framed Tam's face, as
he "stood and glowered, amazed and
curious, while the mirth and fun
grew fast and furious," and to see
the corner where auld Nick sat, "A
towzie tyke, black, grim and large;
to gie them mure was his charge,"
and to see where the witches danced
To visit the "Auld Brig" where
"Ae spring brought off her maister
hale. But left behind her ain grey
tail."

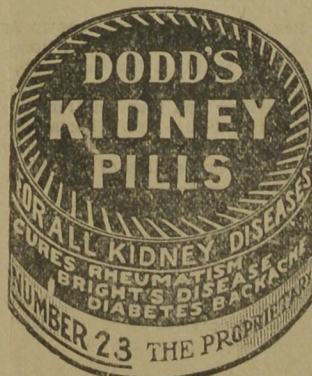
SECRET OF HIS POPULARITY

What is the secret of the wonder-
ful popularity of Burns, and why do
Scots so honor him? Because his
songs find a response in the hearts
of all the people. Because he taught
us the love of country. He preached
true democracy. He exposed the
hypocrite. He opened the eyes of the
Scottish people to the grandeur and
beauty of their native country. Burns
said to his wife one day, "Jean,
they will think more of me one
hundred years hence than they do to-
day." Has his prophecy come true?
Aye, more than himself anticipated,
for few if any have been so honored
as Burns.

It was during an eventful epoch in
Scotland's history that "A blast o'
Jan'war win blew hansom in on one
Robin." At that time Scotland was
fast losing her identity, was being
swallowed up by England. Scotch-
men were becoming ashamed of their
mother tongue. Now Blackie tells us
"That when a nation, when a people
so far forget themselves as to get
into such a condition as that," then
it is that "the great architect of the
universe if he sees fit, if he thinks
such people worth saving, sends an
emissary to call them back to where
they belong. And this is what
Burns was and what he did this
was the purpose of his existence and
how well he fulfilled his mission and
the legacy he left to the Scottish
people. This is why his memory is so
honored. He was the saviour of
Scotland. He is the voice of Scot-
land.

NOTICE OF LEGISLATION

The City of Fredericton will pre-
sent at the approaching Session of
the Legislative Assembly of New
Brunswick the following bills for en-
actment:

(1) A Bill authorizing the City to
grant certain concessions to the Pal-
mer-McLellan Company, Limited, and
to fix the valuation of the property
of Frasers Limited in this City for
taxation purposes.

(2) A Bill to authorize the issue
of Debentures for the erection of a
Fire Station, a Police Station, for
the purchase of Queen's Park and
for the further construction of Per-
manent Street Pavements, not ex-
ceeding in the whole the sum of
Forty-five Thousand Dollars (\$45,000)

(3) A Bill to provide for lighting
by electricity the Fredericton and
St. Mary's Highway Bridge.
