## A BOOST FOR FREDERICTON

Canadian Mail, London, Has Article  
on This City--Era of  
Prosperity

The Canadian Mail, London, Janu-  
ary 18, prints a fine picture of the  
City of Fredericton, where much in-  
dustrial development is in progress  
and has the following article:

There is no doubt that the Prov-  
ince of New Brunswick has entered  
upon the greatest era of its develop-  
ment, and with the other Maritime  
Provinces is now enjoying its great-  
est progress. The great opportuni-  
ties in different branches of agricul-  
ture are being perceived; commar-  
cial fruit-growing is expanding; the  
sheep industry is being revived;  
poultry-raising is bringing in sub-  
stantial profits and the government  
has inaugurated a progressive in-  
migration policy by the introduction of  
its ready-made farm scheme. Such is  
the optimism in the province that  
its newspapers proclaim that the  
west has had its turn and the day  
is now theirs.

In this all-round revival of activity  
and burst of progress Fredericton,  
the capital city, is taking a promi-  
nent part. It is but a comparatively  
short time since Fredericton's indus-  
tries were largely confined to lumber  
mills, and while they served to em-  
ploy large numbers it remained for  
new industries to spring up in the  
city that are today providing power-  
ful factors in the competition for the  
trade of the Dominion.

A boot and shoe factory establish-  
ed in the city has progressed until  
it is today recognized throughout  
Canada as one of the most formi-  
dable competitors for the boot and  
shoe trade of the Dominion. There  
is a firm manufacturing shoe-packs  
and larrigans and such is the demand  
for this firm's goods that two new  
larrigan factories are about to share  
in the work. An up-to-date foundry  
is kept busy, a brick and tile plant,  
with one of the most modern plants  
in Canada, is steadily increasing its  
output; additional business for the  
foundry has necessitated that con-  
cern laying down new plant, and the  
products of a company which turns  
out lumbering tools are in request  
wherever the lumbering industry  
flourishes in Canada. Other indus-  
trial concerns which are doing well  
are manufacturers of lumber, farm  
wagons, carriages, canoes. The  
pulp and paper mills are also very  
busy.

Excellent as is the situation at  
Fredericton in regard to manufac-  
turers, there is likely to be a consid-  
erable increase in their number, for  
the city offers many opportunities  
which are not to be had elsewhere.

Fredericton's admirable situation  
on the St. John River, eighty-four  
miles by water and sixty-four miles  
by rail from the winter port of St.  
John, makes it possible to assemble  
the raw material to excellent advan-  
tage. The city can be easily reached  
from any part of the continent and  
when the railways now under con-  
struction are completed, the city will  
have unequalled transportation facili-  
ties. In addition to its many rail-  
ways, Fredericton enjoys an adequate  
steamboat service on the St. John  
River, which handles heavy freight.

While a manufacturer in Fredericton  
would have easy access to the grow-  
ing Maritime Provinces, there is no  
reason why he should confine himself  
to this market, though it may ad-  
mittedly be a large one. In fact, the  
experience of local manufacturers has  
proved that there is no difficulty en-  
countered in marketing their products  
from the Atlantic to the Pacific, in  
view of the low freight rates which  
Fredericton enjoys.

The cheapest form of power avail-  
able in Fredericton at the present  
time is electricity supplied by the  
local electric light and power com-  
pany, which has filed with the Public  
Utilities Commission the lowest  
rates in force in Eastern Canada.

Several companies have been for-  
med to develop the splendid water  
power of the St. John River.

Some of the other manufacturing  
lines for which there are openings in  
Fredericton are as follows: Automob-  
iles, boots and shoes, bags, biscuits,  
bottles, clothing, woolen goods, lea-  
ther, shirts and collars, lasts, flour,  
gloves, cotton, pottery, rubber and  
felt goods, steel castings, tiles and  
woodenware, canning, pickling and  
pork packing plants, etc.

## THE BANKING ACT PASSED

(Continued from page one)

Mr. Emmerson laid down the axiom  
which he thought should be followed  
in the interpreting of every cause of  
the bill. "Where a public concession  
is given," he said, "a public com-  
pensation should be rendered and pub-  
lic supervision should be exercised.  
Power unrestrained tends to tyr-  
anny."

The minister of finance had come  
to parliament charged with entering  
it under the aegis of strong men to  
do their will so far as in his power  
lay. "When these statements were  
made," said Mr. Emmerson, "I  
doubted them." The very openness of  
his countenance and his ever genial  
smile should dispel suspicion. Some-  
times, however there has been a  
wavering doubt in my mind and in  
the treatment of this bill the doubt  
has revived. It has revived still fur-  
ther since he proposed the second  
reading. I saw many members on  
that side of the House applaud the  
utterances of the member for North  
Ontario which utterances must have  
found lodgment in their heart and  
brain. But there are signs that there  
has been suppression of that zeal in  
the interest of the depositors, share-  
holders and people at large. If there  
was any doubt as far as the minister  
of finance was concerned, as to that  
suppression we need only turn to the  
utterance of the right honourable  
leader of the government and the  
tone in which it was made.

### THE "INTERESTS" IN THE SADDLE

"No member can sit here without  
realizing that there are influences  
which bring about strange conditions  
I have ventured to say that the  
great transportation, financial and  
industrial interests have a party  
politics. They enter the door Mr.  
Speaker, whether it be to your  
right or to your left. There is need  
for vigilance."

Mr. Emmerson turned his atten-  
tion to the question of external au-  
dit, for which he said there was a  
strong demand throughout the coun-  
try. He deprecated the objections of  
the minister to government inspec-  
tion and asked for an explanation  
of why the banks opposed external  
audit.

He stated that he had evidence that  
many of the banks were charging  
eight and even twelve per cent in  
eastern Canada and that, in the face  
of the provision against it.

Mr. Emmerson thought that the  
government should pay a higher rate  
of interest on the government postal  
banks, if it did they would force  
the banks to raise their interest.  
The reason that the government paid  
only two and a half and three per  
cent was on account of the power of  
the banking interests.

Mr. Emmerson said that the banks  
today were acting as landlords in  
direct violation of the banking act.  
They were constructing buildings  
throughout the Maritime Province  
and renting them. This was contrary  
to the provisions of the bank act.  
As far as he knew there was only  
one bank which did not pursue this  
policy.

Out of what fund he asked, do they  
construct these big Toronto sky-  
scrapers.

"One of the deposits," was the  
reply of Mr. Turill.

That there was a shortage of  
money at certain times in Canada,  
Mr. Emmerson attributed to the fact  
that they shipped their money to  
New York.

"I am surprised," said Hon. Ro-  
dolph Lemieux sarcastically.

"I know my hon friend is shock-  
ed," said Mr. Emmerson.

"What about the farmer?" asked  
Mr. Lemieux.

"Oh, it would not do for the  
farmer to sell his wares in the United  
States."

Continuing he said that the bank-  
ing institutions collected the savings  
of farmers and fishermen, assembled  
them in Toronto and Montreal and  
sent them to New York where they  
could make ten, fifteen or twenty per  
cent on call loans.

"Whereas the exhibition, held in  
Fredericton in 1911 under the aus-  
pices of the Agricultural Society  
opened and closed on Saturday.

And Whereas the two Sabbaths fol-  
lowing the opening and closing were  
desecrated by the performance of a  
great deal of unnecessary work, which  
robbed many of their rest day and  
many others of the quiet guaranteed  
to the citizens of the City, the Min-  
isterial Association learns with deep  
regret that practically the same ar-  
rangements have been made for the  
opening and closing the Exhibition of  
1913. The Association is of opinion  
that this objectionable feature had  
not occurred to the mind of the Agri-  
cultural Society in making the ar-  
rangements for 1911 and is further of  
opinion that it is just possible that  
the Society is not now fully possess-  
ed of the extent to which these ob-  
jectionable features were carried. The  
Association is convinced that by op-  
ening and closing near the mid-week  
all this unnecessary violation of the  
Sabbath Law would be prevented. It  
is further convinced that the Society  
could so arrange the work that in  
any event the objectionable features
