THE SCOTT ACT
AND CRIMINAL LAW

(Chatham Gazette)

As there are many opinions on the question of the councils and individual member's connection with Scott Act enforcement or lack of enforcement, The Gazette has taken pains to search out the Criminal Law statutes and finds that the only two sections which in any way apply to the matter are these:

DISOBEYING A STATUTE

Everyone is guilty of an indictable offense and liable to one year's imprisonment who, without lawful excuse, disobeys any act of the Parliament of Canada or of any legislature in Canada by wilfully doing any act which forbids, or omitting to do any act which it requires to be done; unless some penalty or other mode of punishment is expressly provided by law.

COMPOUNDING OFFENCES

Everyone who, having violated any of the provisions of this act or of any act in force in any province, respecting the issue of licenses for the sale of fermented or spirituous liquors, or of the Temperance Act of 1864, compromises, compounds or settles, or offers or attempts to compromise, compound or settle the offence with any person or persons, with the view of preventing any complaint being made in respect thereof, or if a complaint has been made, with the view of getting rid of such complaint or of stopping or of having the same dismissed for want of prosecution or otherwise, is guilty of an offence against this act, and on conviction thereof, shall be liable to imprisonment at hard labor in the common jail of the county or district in which the offence was committed, for any term not exceeding three months.

Everyone who is concerned in, or is a party to the compromise, composition or settlement mentioned, in this section is guilty of an offence against this act, and on conviction thereof, shall be liable to imprisonment in the common jail of the county or district in which the offence was committed, for any term not exceeding three months.
