(2) A Bill to authorize the issue of Debentures for the erection of a Fire Station, a Police Station, for the purchase of Queen's Park and for the further construction of Permanent Street Pavements, not exceeding in the whole the sum of Forty-five Thousand Dollars (\$45,000).

(3) A Bill to provide for lighting by electricity the Fredericton and St. Mary's Highway Bridge.

Division No. 1.—For all voters residing or owning property above the centre line of Carleton Street prolonged, at or near the City Hall in the said City.  
Division No. 2.—For all voters residing or owning property in the remainder of the said City not included in Division No. 1, at or near the County Court House in the said City.  
Polls will be opened at the above named places at nine o'clock a.m., of the said day of Election, and will close at the hour of four o'clock p.m. of the same day.

Nominations for the office of Mayor or Aldermen must be filed in the office of the City Clerk, City Hall, at or before four o'clock on MONDAY the 3rd day of MARCH next, and must be signed by at least two qualified Electors and the signatures attested to under oath.  
Forms for Nomination may be procured at the City Clerk's office.  
A Certificate of the City Treasurer showing that all Rates and Taxes of the Candidate have been paid within the time required by law must be attached to each Nomination Paper.

At the same time and place the Electors are requested by resolution of the City Council to express their preference of one of the following methods of selecting a Police Commission:

1. Shall the City Council continue to appoint from among the Aldermen a Police Commission?

2. Shall the Police Commission be elected by a vote of the Citizens in the same manner as the Mayor and Aldermen?

**House Numbering**

**HOW THE PEOPLE'S MONEY IS SQUANDERED****Farmers of the Province Must Pay a Portion of the Cost of Social Functions And Snobbery Under Flemming Rule-- Heavy Bridge Expenditures**

There was more money spent last year upon janitors, charwomen, soap, paint, hardware and many other things for the Legislative and Departmental Buildings than was given to any of the counties in the province except one for the upkeep of the roads.

It cost nearly \$14,000 to pay for keeping these buildings in shape—an enormous sum considering the nature of the service that is rendered. For the St. John government rooms some \$500 or \$600 is included in the above sum.

These facts can be found in the Board of Works report just printed and handed to the Legislature.

The 'caretakers, janitors, foremen, etc., were paid the tidy sum of \$2,198.75; the charwomen, \$779.04; the jobbing carpenters, \$1,409.57 and the painters, \$839.50.

There are many other items to be found under the heading "Legislative Building and Offices," and included in this amount of \$13,906.18, which do not seem to have any place in such a column. For example, there is a charge of \$15 for "decorating the Assembly Room for the governor's ball" and again another charge of \$30 for "doral decorations."

The flowers and their arrangement cost the people of New Brunswick for this one evening \$45, out this is not all. "A door-keeper at the governor's ball" cost \$2, "a lady-in-waiting at governor's ball," \$1.50. Ladies-in-waiting should be more expensive than mere "doorkeepers" but in this case it is not so. There were several "ball boys at governor's ball" \$1 and \$2 each, and even a "policeman at governor's ball" cost \$2.

No doubt there are more expenses than these in other reports that the people of New Brunswick paid for in connection with this ball. They used to pay for them for Governor Tweedie's entertainments and perhaps for those who preceded him but it is time some one put a stop to it. Only a year or so ago The Gleaner had a charge for more than \$100 for ball programs or invitations.

There are a lot of people in New Brunswick who do not believe in balls or dancing or such frivolity, particularly in the halls of the Legislature and they should not be called upon to pay for any such nonsense.

They listened in 1907 and before March, 1908, to the professions of many of the gentlemen who now hold office, they heard the expense of the coach at the front door of the Legislature condemned; they heard the ridicule heaped upon the white-gloved page boys, they listened to the tirade against the expense and the "fuss and feathers" in connection with the opening of the Legislature every year and they naturally expected reform. But the coach still waits at the front door for the speaker and the members, the white-gloved page boys still do duty, the red coats and the bands still come to the Legislature opening and powder burns more freely than ever. And the Tory members laugh at how easily the people are fooled.

Another item included in this sum of \$13,906.18, "decorating Legislative and Departmental Buildings," \$125 will surely shock the Yankee-hating loyal Tories, for it was paid to the Massachusetts Decorating Company. That a company from this old rebel state should be chartered by Loyalist New Brunswick to decorate their most sacred buildings in honor of the distinguished uncle of His Majesty the King, the governor general of Canada, is enough to make the anti-reciprocity-Tory brigade demand the scalp of that Irish John Morrissy at once.

If anyone would like to know who are able enough financially to dash over the country in "buzz wagons" a few pages in the back of the Board of Works report would make interesting reading. There will be found a list of those who long for speedways criss-crossing the province, who

use gasoline to make their way over the bumps and hollows of the present highways, who drive cars of all makes and names ranging as high as fifty and as low as ten horse-power. They are all licensed by the Department of Works and it is somewhat interesting to note that the number plates cost \$273 and the expressage upon them the remarkable sum of \$133.90. The Gleaner was paid \$96.50 for printing the little auto folder containing the act, the typewriting in connection therewith cost \$300, postage stamps \$65, and "extra services" travelling expenses, etc., \$205.35. The whole expense in connection with "motor vehicles" was \$1,238.49 which will seem, to those who know anything about it, altogether out of proportion to the income.

Kent county still leads in bridge expenditure. Last year it was over \$50,000, this year \$41,816.63. The other counties do not fare so well. It is interesting for comparison's sake to read the amounts:
