### AFTERNOON SESSION

Yesterday afternoon the greater part of the session was occupied by talks upon poultry raising. Mr. W. A. Brown, Dominion Poultry Superintendent and Mr. Seth Jones, Provincial Poultry Superintendent both spoke.

Mr. Brown gave a very interesting address pointing out the importance of the poultry industry to the farmer and to the Dominion.

The poultry industry stated Mr. Brown was national in its scope. The Canadian hen could thrive in all parts of the Dominion and the possibilities of the poultry business. Dairy-cattle had decreased in number, sheep had done the same but hens had increased in number steadily. The consumption of poultry products in Canada was growing all the time, eggs taking the place of meats which were becoming scarcer. He knew of no branch of agriculture that offered better opportunities than did poultry raising.

Replying to the questions Mr. Brown said that hard grains made good feed for poultry. Meat and milk were needed to a certain extent. Succulent vegetable food such as mangolds, cabbage and particularly clover were much needed. He tried Superintendent also was heard.
