Yesterday afternoon the greater part of the session was occupied by talks upon poultry raising. Mr. W. A. Brown, Dominion Poultry Super-intendent and Mr. Seth Jones, Provincial Poultry Superintendent both

Mr. Brown gave a very interesting address pointing out the importance of the poultry industry to the farmand to the Dominion.

The poultry industry stated Mr. Brown was national in its scope. The Canadian hen could thrive in al parts of the Dominion and the pos-sibilities of the poultry business. Dairy-cattle had decreased in number, sheep had done the same but hens had increased in number steadily. The consumption of poultry products in Canada was growing all the time, eggs taking the place of meats which were becoming scarcer. He knew of no branch of agriculture that offered better opportunities than did poultry raising.
