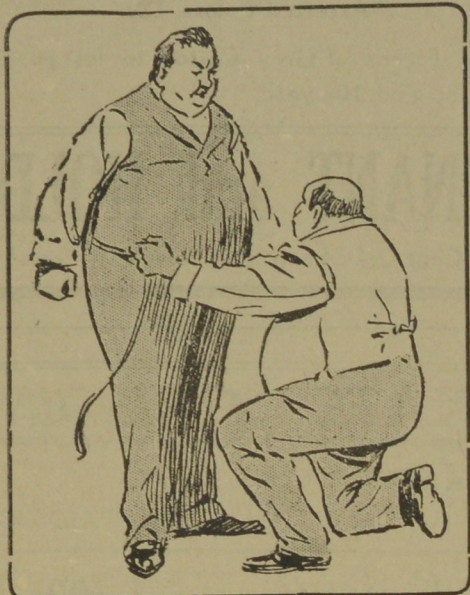

## THISTLES OF ST. JOHN WON SINGLES AND DOUBLES AT BONSPIEL

Fredericton Rinks Put up Good Game  
--Reached Fourth Round of  
Singles Competition

St. John, N. B., February 21.—The honors in the single and double rink competition in the first bonspiel of the New Brunswick branch of the Royal Caledonia Curling Club were won by rinks of the Thistle Curling Club. The double rink competition was decided yesterday afternoon but it was nearly 2.30 o'clock this morning before it was decided that the single rink honors rested between the two rinks of Thistle curlers.

The semi-final match in the singles which began before midnight, was watched with interest by the large crowd in the Thistle rink and all remained until the last stone was laid. This match was between the rinks skipped by W. A. Shaw (Thistles) and E. S. Roxborough (Carleton), and the result was in doubt until the finish, which showed Shaw in the lead 16 to 9.

The Shaw rink will play off with the Brown rink this evening.

The bonspiel was a great success and will no doubt prove a great boost to the sport in the province.

The winners of the doubles will be skipped by J. S. Malcolm and W. A. Shaw and both rinks acquitted themselves well and the final score of 34 against 23 of Sackville was a good ending to a brilliant series of games.

The winners of the doubles will retain the Blair trophy for the year but it will be necessary for it to be won three years to become the permanent possession of any club. The shield offered by J. A. Sinclair president of the New Brunswick branch of the Royal Caledonia Curling Club becomes the permanent property of the Thistles. The individual members of the winning rink will receive watch fobs donated by E. A. Smith, president of the St. Andrew's Club and emblematic stick pins given by F. F. Burpee, president of the Thistle Curling Club. Each member of the rink of the second club will receive emblematic pins, which were given by E. L. Rising, vice-president of the St. Andrew's Club.

The prizes in the singles which will go to the rink winning in tonight's match are four emblematic pins, given by M. Lodge of Moncton, and the second rink will also receive pins, which were given by C. H. Ferguson of the St. Andrew's Club.

## VERY LITTLE BUSINESS BEFORE THE HOUSE

The House met at 3 o'clock. Hon. Mr. Murray presented the report of the Standing Rules Committee.

Mr. Woods, in behalf of Mr. Dickson, presented the report of the Committee on Agriculture.

Mr. Grannan presented a petition in favor of a bill to provide for the establishment of a Municipal Farm in the City and County of St. John. Mr. Tilley, on behalf of Hon. Mr. Wilson, introduced a bill to allow the City of St. John to sell certain properties.

Mr. Tilley introduced a bill to authorize the City and County of St. John to expropriate private lands.

Hon. Mr. McLeod presented a statement of the bonded debt of the Town of Newcastle, the annual report of the Miramichi Natural History Society and the 26th annual report of the Provincial Board of Health.

Hon. Mr. Grimmer introduced bills to amend the Registry Act, relating to the election of councillors in the parishes of Clair and Baker Lake, in Madawaska county in 1911, relating to the Provincial Hospital.

Mr. Grannan introduced a bill to determine what safeguard shall be placed by the St. John Railway Co. over their track on the North Road—Wharf.

The House went into committee with Mr. Woods in the chair.

The bill relating to Hamar Greenwood was agreed to.

The bill entitled The Fire Insurance Policies Act was considered. There was some discussion as to the phraseology of some of the sections.

Mr. Carter brought up the question of provision as to the cases where the building damaged by fire are repaired by the insurer.

Dr. Price expressed the opinion that some provision should be made to protect the poor man in cases where the insurer carried on the work of repairs and there were costs in connection with arbitration or other proceedings in connection with whether the repairs were satisfactory or not.

Mr. Mahoney was told that the bill would not be made retroactive.

Mr. Carter moved for reconsideration of the Twentieth Section of the First Schedule. He was opposed to giving fire insurance companies power to cancel insurance without legal cause.

Hon. Mr. Grimmer said that insurance companies were entitled to some protection from fraud. The companies wouldn't give up business and premiums unless there was some reason for so doing.

Mr. Young said that he had known of cases where policies had been cancelled without cause.

Mr. Swim said he knew of a case where a policy had been cancelled without cause and it had cost the insured a considerable amount more

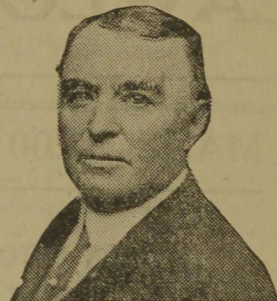
