Bangor Lost Two Games To Fredericton Saturday

Bangor, June 1—Bangor lost both
games of the double-header with Fred-
ericton at Maplewood Park yester-
day, the first by a score of 10 to 5
and the second, a ten-inning game
3 to 1.

It looks as though the Maroons
have a pet jinx that is following

ST. JOHN BEATEN BY ST. CROIX

St. John, June 2—St. Croix com-
pletely outclassed the Marathons Sat-
urday afternoon on the local grounds
when the league leaders won their
second fixture from the Greeks by the
score of 7-1.

The fans were there in force, fully
1,800 of them, to cheer the home
team in the fight, but the game was
so one-sided that the Greek support-
ers did not get a single chance to
root, and the only redeeming feature
of the meeting was the evident class
and speed of the team from the bor-
der.

The Marathons did not get a safe
hit, and with the exception of one
long, fast grounder to short, every
ball batted by the Greeks was an
effort of the vaguest sort, and offer-
ed not the slightest fielding difficulty.

The St. Croix team is easily the
best that has performed here this
season and has set a standard in
play that will cause considerable
shifting on the part of its opponents
before the others come within strik-
ing distance.

Conley, who started the game of
the visitors, went three innings as a
retired when the Marathons came to
bat in the fourth, as the fans wished
to see Lee, who succeeded him, in
action.

The pitching of both St. Croix men
was so effective that only five Greeks
reached first and as three of these
drew passes, and one was hit, the

BOMBARDIER WELLS KNOCKED OUT BY FRENCH PUGILIST

Carpentier Won in Fourth of Twenty-
Round Bout---Frenchman Down
Twice Himself Early in Fight

Bombardier W.L.C. Ghent, Belgium, June 1—George
Carpentier, the French heavyweight
pugilist, today won the heavyweight
championship of Europe by knocking
out Bombardier Wells, the ex-British
champion, in the fourth round. Car-
pentier himself took the count of
nine in the first round and was again
sent to the floor in the second. In
the third round, the Frenchman dis-
covered Bombardier's weak stomach
and showered blows in the mid-sec-
tion, crumpling up the Englishman.
He ended the fight with a right hand
punch to the solar plexus before the
end of the fourth.

Round 1—Carpentier rushed but was
met with a hard left to the face.
The Englishman followed quickly with
short arm right to the head, send-
ing the Frenchman down for the
count of nine. Carpentier came up
bleeding.

Round 2—Wells soon had the
Frenchman to the ropes again,
seemingly landing where he pleased.
A left hook floored Carpentier. The
Frenchman was groggy throughout
the remainder of the round, but as
Wells failed to push his advantage,
the Frenchman was able to stall.

Round 3—Carpentier closed with his
adversary at the sound of the gong
and showed to advantage in the in-
fighting. Wells was soon in distress
from a shower of blows to the stom-
ach and the Frenchman sent him
reeling with a hard swing to the
jaw.

Round 4—Carpentier came up the
fresher of the two. Having discover-
ed the Englishman's weak spot he
continued boring in. He missed a
hard right as a result of which both
the fighters slipped to the floor.
They were up immediately and Car-
pentier landed a left to the body,
following this with a terrific right to
the solar plexus, which floored Wells
for the count.

The bout was scheduled for twenty
rounds.
