OHIO POLITICIANS

CHARGED WITH BRIBERY

Columbus, O., Jan. 20—The case of
State Senator Edward T. Crawford
of Carroll County, indicted on a
charge of bribery, was called for trial
here today. This is another in the
series of graft prosecutions which
have already resulted in placing sev-
eral members of the last State legis-
lature behind prison bars.

GOVERNMENT ASKED

Dx-Speaker Marcell Bonaventure,
supported Mr. Emmerson. But for po-
litical reasons the Gaspe peninsula
would today be on the highway be-
tween Canada and Europe. Many
years ago, Sir Charles Tupper and
Sir Hector Langevin had advocated
a government built branch of the In-
tercolonial to open up the Gaspe
peninsula. That had failed and pri-
vate enterprise had built from the In-
tercolonial from Gaspe.

Hon. Mr. Lemieux and Mr. Gauthier
supported the demand and for gov-
ernment acquisition of lines in the
Gaspe peninsula.

Mr. Loggie, Liberal of Northumber-
land pleaded with the government to
retain the Intercolonial as the peo-
ple's property. He asked the minister
to end the uneasiness of the people
by declaring there was no founda-
tion for the statement by Matthew
Lodge of Moncton that the govern-
ment had made a bargain for the dis-
posal of the Intercolonial.

BORDEN'S BROKEN PROMISES.

Mr. Sinclair said that in the last
campaign Premier Borden had spoken
three times in his constituency and
had each time promised the construc-
tion of the Guysboro branch and the
Musquodoboit branches. In fact, he
had claimed to be the originator of
them. The Liberals, before going
out of office, had let a contract for
the construction. What had Premier
Borden done after taking office to
keep his pledge? He had done noth-
ing but to cancel the contract let by
the Liberals.

E. N. MacDonald said he admired
Hon. Mr. Emmerson's persistence
but warned him to expect no result
from the prime minister or the min-
ister of railways. Premier Borden
had promised in the last election
that he would acquire the branch
lines if given the power. He was,
and put into office a man who not
only declined to acquire branch lines
but declined to operate those already
acquired.

GRAHAM OPTIMISTIC.

Hon. George P. Graham, former
minister of railways, said he looked
for the improvement of Eastern Can-
ada very greatly during the next ten
years. There were signs there that
a great revival would take place un-
less some great blunders were made.
He had introduced a bill in 1910 for
the acquisition of branch lines and
that bill was supported by Mr. Bor-
den, now prime minister, and by Mr.
Rhodes of Amherst.

Mr. Graham said that the people
of the east were entitled to trans-
portation whether the roads immedi-
ately paid or not. The late govern-
ment had started construction of
some branches in Nova Scotia and
had in a bill sought authority to
have the following branch lines: The
Hampton & St. Martins, Albert Rail-
way, Moncton & Buctouche, Caraguet
& Gaspe, York & Carleton, Intercol-
onial Railway, Cape Breton Railway,
Terrescoulata Railway, Elgin & Have-
lock, Kent Northern.

Hon. Mr. Cochrane—Do you still
hold that the branches should be
leased and not bought?

Mr. Graham—Buy or lease accord-
ing to each particular case, but whether
or not you propose to dispose
of the Intercolonial you should ac-
quire the branch lines, for with them
it is a better property to keep or to
sell than it is without them.

Hon. Mr. Cochrane—There is no
proposal to dispose of the Intercol-
onial.

Mr. Graham sought a promise from
Mr. Rogers, who was leading the
House, that the resolution would
again come on for discussion. He
failed to get it and the House ad-
journed at 12.30.

NOTED DIPLOMAT

IS 70 YEARS OLD

London, Jan. 20—M. Paul Cambon,
who has held the important post of
French Ambassador to the Court of
St. James for the past fifteen years
was the guest of honor at a notable
banquet given today in celebration of
his seventieth birthday anniversary.

WESTERN STOCKMEN

GATHER AT DENVER

Denver, Colo., Jan. 20—The eighth
annual National Western Stock Show
opened at the stock yards here today
and will continue through the week.
The show is the largest in the his-
tory of the organization. An attend-
ance of about 40,000 stockmen and
farmers is expected during the week
from every part of the west.

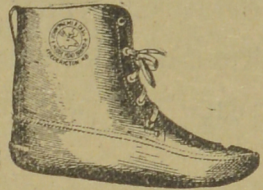
