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THE BOOM SPIRIT

A writer in The Springhill, N. S., Tribune makes the following comment on the boom spirit which prevails in the Town of Amherst:

"Busy Amherst has a band of pilgrims building up their town. They called a meeting of the citizens last week and the people packed the hall. The leaders spoke of a new industry for the busy town and at once the citizens subscribed \$100,000 for the introduction of the industry. Harmony, good will and enthusiasm prevailed. There are two kinds of people in every town, the parasites selfishly fattening on everybody and everything and the unselfish upbuilders of the community. Amherst has entered the latter class. The town is consequently growing by leaps and bounds and the people are prosperous. Amherst is teaching towns the important lesson that men are the best products. It has leading men, the rest follows. Nova Scotia needs to create a breed of men far-seeing, deep-thinking and self-sacrificing for the public good. Such men are always productive and progressive, realizing their obligations to their fellows and the province. They inspire and influence the average man and lift to higher levels the people and towns. Amherst bounds forward because it has the best of all products in its leading men. Amherst, while it has such men and continues to produce them, is destined to become the most populous and prosperous town in the province."

Fredericton wants new industries and it needs them badly. How would it do to adopt the plan which has made Amherst the greatest manufacturing town in the Maritime Provinces?

CAN THIS BE TRUE?

Mr. J. K. Pinder one of the representatives of York in the House of Assembly made the statement in public not long ago that the Fredericton highway bridge had been closed to traffic merely to give vent to a personal spite against Dr. H. H. McNally, who is his son-in-law. As Mr. Pinder has tried his best to have the bridge kept open and has been unsuccessful it is presumed he knows what he is talking about. If his statement is true it certainly discloses a most deplorable state of affairs. The Mail differs with Dr. McNally on political questions, but it recognizes in him a most worthy citizen and a physician of great energy and skill. He has built up a large practice and it is but natural that others of the same profession who have less ability and who are known to be less honorable in their business dealings, should seek to annoy and injure him. But it is scarcely believable in this free country that designing men should be able to use the machinery of one of the departments of the government in harassing a fellow citizen whose only offence is that he has made a success of his chosen calling and does not find it necessary to toady to certain political bosses and beg political favors from them in order to eke out an existence.

Moncton Transcript.—The Hon. H. R. Emmerson, M. P., in an interview in Montreal takes, as might naturally be expected, strong ground against any movement to hand the control of the Intercolonial Railway over to a private company. In addition, Mr. Emmerson says, however, that he does not believe a new line should be built from Painsec Junction, along the North Shore to Wallace, linking up, the North Shore systems, and thence connecting with Truro, N. S. This is precisely the view, which The Transcript has been advocating, and thought the despatch summarized, does not bring the details out clearly, yet it is presumed that Mr. Emmerson would favor the diversion of the present Intercolonial Railway around the base of Cobequid Mountain via the south shore as a separate and independent improve-

ment, altogether apart from linking up the North Shore lines. This is precisely what The Transcript has been advocating.

Discussing the proposal to increase the resident game license, the St. John Standard, government organ, has this to say:

"For some time past there has been an agitation to increase the local license fee, and it is not improbable, that within a short time for the protection of those who take out licenses, there will be an increase. The Guides Association want the fee for moose increased to \$10 and the license taken from deer altogether. At present a license entitles the holder to kill one bull moose, one caribou, and two deer. Such a drastic change is not likely to be made for one reason, that it would increase poaching and materially reduce the revenue which is needed for protection and benefit no one but a few guides. A fee of three dollars on the other hand would increase the revenue and at the same time lessen the number of hunters, which would make the woods safer in the late fall. The seasons are now satisfactory to all and furnish sufficient protection for the animals."

The Royal Gazette announces that Mr. H. J. Fowler, registrar of deeds for Kings for the past ten years has been dismissed for cause and that Mr. Fred M. Sproule, ex-M.P.P. has been appointed in his place. The "cause" of Mr. Fowler's dismissal was that Mr. Sproule wanted the job and had to have it. The government deferred the matter until compelled to take action.
