HANDS OFF THE PEOPLES RAILWAY

Montreal, Jan. 14—Hon. H. R. Emmerson, ex-ministers of railways and canals, and G. W. Fowler, M.P. both from New Brunswick, and both strong political opponents, met here today and while discussing the position of the Intercolonial in a very friendly manner, stated that they could not agree with Mathew Lodge of Moncton (N.B.), E. M. MacDonald, M.P., and H. J. Logan, ex-M.P., that the government railway should be handed over to the company.

Mr. Fowler went so far as to say that the I.C.R. should not only be extended to the Great Lakes but to the Pacific ocean, and that the people could not get a square deal till this policy was brought about. "I have always thought that Mr. Blair was right when he advocated a government-owned road from Atlantic to the Pacific," chimed in the ex-minister, the member for Westmorland.

CANADIAN TORIES AND BRITISH UNIONISTS

The Standard of London, England, which stands for tariff reform. In its issue of December 18 there appears among the notes from its Parliamentary correspondent the following reference regarding the speech made by Mr. Bonar Law at As-ton-under-Lyne:—

"In order to appreciate the motives which actuated Mr. Bonar Law's pronouncement it is desirable to refer to certain recent happenings. The trend of Canadian feeling on Imperial preferences, and the distrust of food taxation which still lingers in large industrial areas, principally in Lancashire and Yorkshire, are the main factors in the situation with which Mr. Bonar Law dealt. When Mr. Borden was over here this year he made it clear to the Unionist leaders that the Canadian people would welcome a clear declaration on the question of preference from the Conservative party at an early date, and this must almost certainly include a duty on wheat. To some extent a response was given to this view by Lord Lansdowne at the Albert Hall. Mr. Bonar Law has reaffirmed the offer to Canada, but has also made it clear to the great industrial population of the United Kingdom that food taxes will be imposed till after an imperial conference has discussed the matter."

The London Daily News (Liberal) of January 2, declared that when Mr. Borden visited Britain Unionist leaders entered into a compact with him to uphold in this country a policy of Imperial preference, of which food taxes were to form an essential element. This statement was cabled to Canada, but the earlier statement by The Standard was not, so far as The Globe can ascertain.



THREE NEW COMMERCE DIRECTORS NAMED

Toronto, Jan. 14—The forty-sixth annual meeting of the Bank of Commerce shareholders today was marked by the usual interesting addresses covering the Canadian financial and business field by Sir Edmund Walker and General Manager Laird.

No changes in policy were declared the general manager speaking on the dividend question, saying that the policy of paying bonus dividends above the ten per cent. rate would be maintained at any rate for the present, in view of the extraordinary development of the bank's business.

A by-law was passed increasing the number of directors of the bank from nineteen to twenty-two, the new directors named being G. W. Allan of Winnipeg, H. J. Fuller of the Canadian Fairbanks Co., and F. P. Jones, general manager of the Canadian Cement Co., Montreal.
