EX-PRES. MADERO AND SUAREZ

(Continued from page one.)

The department of foreign relations desires to make known as already announced to the ambassador ready announced to the ambassador of the United States, the British minister and other members of the diplomatic corps on various occasions that the government decided at a council of his ministers that all acts relating to Madero and Pino Suarez should be adjudicated strictly according to law, as was their due, and that in consequence the accusation process, if such had taken place, would not have departed one iota from the legal measures applicable to the case.

That after taking this decision, the government agreed to remove Madero and Saurez to the penitentiary, where they would have the necessary security, consideration and comforts.

That yesterday morning the minister of foreign relations so informed Ambassador Wilson saying that the Mexican government would proceed always in accord with the law and that the removal of the ex-president to the penitentiary would be for the reasons afore indicated.

HOW IT HAPPENED

Last night, about 11.30 o'clock I was called with all haste to the National Palace by the chief of staff of the president. An automobile was sent with an aide to take me as well as the secretary of the interior, Alberto Garcia Granados. Surprised by the unusual call, I attempted to talk by telephone with General Blanquet, the military commander, who made known that something serious had occurred.

CONWAY MURDER TRIAL BEGUN AT CHICAGO

Chicago, Ill., Feb. 24—The case of Charles Cramer alias Conway, a circus clown and acrobat, and his wife, Lillian Beatrice Ryall-Conway, was called in court today for trial. The couple was charged with the murder of Miss Sophia Singer a Baltimore heiress, who was robbed and killed last October in a South Side rooming house.

ELECTION LISTS

It is reported that a petition praying the Policeman Fred Currie be retained as a member of the police force is being circulated for signatures and will be presented to the Police Commission. Currie was appointed to the police force on probation and is said not to be satisfactory and on that account will not be appointed permanently to the force. Many citizens wish to have him retained as a policeman believing him to be satisfactory.

On our arrival at midnight at the palace the president explained that Francisco Madero and Jose Pino Suarez, while being conducted to the penitentiary in automobiles were killed in an encounter which the escort, guarding the prisoners, had had with a group of individuals who attempted to liberate the two men.

Other members of the cabinet having arrived, it was agreed that it was an absolute necessity for the honor of the government that not only it proceed in a minute investigation of this act, according to the law's demands, but going further, that immediate notice should be given to the chief attorney of the military court, Jose Vasquez Tagle, that he with the judge advocate, should make investigations and consign those responsible, whoever they might be, to custody, and that proceed to examine them in conformity with the law.

It was agreed also that Attorney General Castellanos, whose energy and competency are well known, should take action in this most unfortunate affair.

According to the reports which President Huerta received and communicated to the ministers, a group of five individuals at a point about point about halfway between the palace and the penitentiary fired upon the chauffeur of the automobile which was under escort. The order was given for more speed. Shortly afterwards another group more numerous sallied from the cross streets, firing on the escort. It seems that Madero and Saurez at this point attempted to escape.

TO ARGUE APPEAL IN LABOR CASE

Washington, D. C., Feb. 24—Arguments on the appeal of Samuel Gompers, Frank Morrison and John Mitchell, American Federation of Labor officials under jail sentences for contempt of court in connection with the Bucks Stove and Range Company case, will begin tomorrow in the Court of Appeals of the District of Columbia. It is expected the arguments will occupy two days.

TO ERECT SUPERSTRUCTURE.

Preparations are being made for the coming of a crew of the Dominion Bridge Company to erect the superstructure of the bridge of the Fredericton & Grand Lake Railway at the mouth of the Nashwaak. The crew is expected shortly. Messrs. D. C. Burpee & Son, contractors for the substructure, have completed their contract and made a good job though working under difficulties. Mr. W. E. Seeley of Fredericton Junction, was inspector of concrete on that contract.

A fairly good idea may be obtained by an inspection of the materials shown by the importers. In the yellows there are mandarins, nasturtium, amber, chameleon and sulphur. It deserves to be well received for it combines beauty with distinction. The name comes from the mineral Labradorite and the color greatly resembles that of lapis lazuli. One of the new pinks is called cherry, but has only a faint kinship to what is called cerise. It is almost red, just like the new color "Nell rose" which is also called Nell pink.
