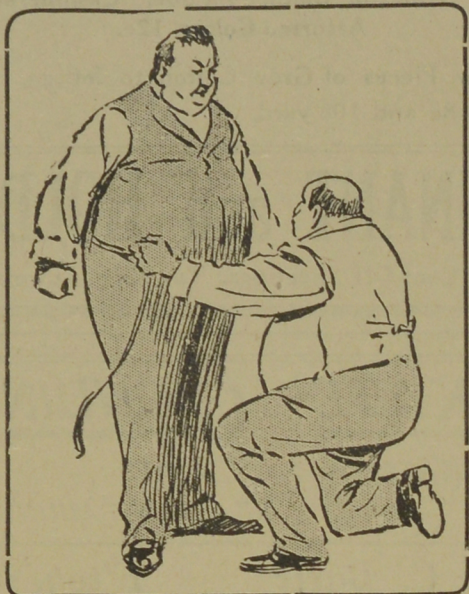

QUEBEC WON N. H. A. TITLE IN FIGHTING GAME

Beat Canadiens by one Goal---Rough-
est Game of Season---Ottawa and
Tumsehs Win

Montreal, Feb. 23—Quebec fought its way to victory over the Canadiens on Saturday night by a score of seven to six before the record crowd of the season. In doing so they secured for themselves the title of champions of the National Hockey Association for the second time.

The game was the roughest played here this winter, the players slashing, cross-checking and roughing it generally, regardless of the penalties handed out. Personal ill-feeling among the players came to the front and rank rowdiness was indulged in by Hall and Lalonde.

In the second period Lalonde cut Hall's eyes open. Hall refused to retire and the next time Lalonde came down the ice Hall handed him a severe cross-check and followed it with a smash over the head with his stick. He then jabbed Lalonde in the face with the butt end of his stick and was ruled off. Lalonde used his stick in the next period in nasty tactics and was also ruled off. Penalties were also handed out to Bubeau, Laviolette, Povey and Mummery, but none of them seemed to be commensurate with the offenses, however, the officials being guided by the playing rules.

OTTAWA 9, WANDERERS 3.

Ottawa, Feb. 23—Wanderers and Ottawas played a joke game before the slimmest crowd of the season at the local arena Saturday night. It ended in an easy win for the Ottawas by nine goals to three.

TECUMSEHS 5, TORONTOS 3.

Toronto, Feb. 23—The expected reversal of form did not materialize at the Arena on Saturday night, the blue shirts having the long end of a five to three score. After their victory on Wednesday, also over the Indians, many looked for Nicholson's crew to come back, because of the numerous reversals that have taken place this season amongst the professional teams.

As this was the last meeting of the two teams and as a number of grievances had to be settled in some way, the game was naturally not ladylike. There was only one bad accident, Horace Gaul of the Indians, who relieved Corbeau in the second period, although only on the ice a short time, had a number of unfriendly arguments with Davidson. In a head-on collision with Davidson, after about ten minutes of play, he was badly used up and had to be carried off the ice. Both McNamara tried hard to get their much lighter opponents but were unsuccessful. Davidson was also given a rest. Corbeau gave him a nasty slash across the foot, which roused McGiffin's blood. He made a terrific slash at Corbeau's head but the goddess of luck saved the big Indian from the offended player's wrath. Long arguments followed over the penalties.

Los Angeles, Feb. 22—A deadly right swing four times repeated ended the scheduled twenty-four round bout at Vernon today between Knockout Brown, the New York lightweight, and Joe Rivers of Los Angeles, with victory for the Mexican before the end of the tenth round. Marysville Overwhelmed Fredericton In Poor Game

The hockey game Saturday night at the Arctic Rink was won by the Marysville Crescents by a score of 12 to 7. A big score, heavy penalties and lots of rough play were the features. The game was a poor one and the spectators were not particularly well pleased with it. It was another example of six-men hockey. Irving Wade was missing from the Marysville line-up and Hughes and McLean from the Fredericton team. McLean was pressed into service as referee, a heavy cold not preventing him from acting in that capacity. Carl Hovey was shifted to centre by the Crescents and was the big noise in the scoring line, making seven goals. Brogan and MacMorris scored twice each and Fred Wade once. Taking things all round, Marysville could do about as they liked with the Fredericton team, as it was Saturday night. Simms of Gibson, replaced "Tanker" Hughes at point, and although very aggressive and checking hard, could not fill Hughes' position. On the forward line Tom Coward was in McLean's place but was much handicapped by lack of weight.

Brogan and Fred Wade on the Marysville defence, were in good form and kept up a constant warfare with Walker, the Fredericton coverpoint. There was a clash between Walker and Brogan every time the two came near one another. In the net "Tart" Titus for Fredericton, played his usual good game but as he was given little protection, could not keep the score down. Galloway and Arnold worked hard in the Red and White forward line, but were up against a hard proposition.

LATE IN STARTING.

The game was late starting on account of failure to locate referees. This was finally arranged by sending Roy Robertson and Fred McLean on the ice to work the double referee system. It was not a very successful attempt but served to get the game going at about nine o'clock, after the crowd was pretty tired waiting.
