journment of the House.

WILL OPPOSE  
CHANGE IN ROUTE  
OF VALLEY RY.

Board of Trade Executive to Meet To-  
night to Organize Delegation to  
Appear Before Government—  
Other Boards Active

The executive of the Fredericton  
Board of Trade will meet with the  
Board's Transportation Committee  
at eight o'clock tonight for the pur-  
pose of organizing a delegation to  
appear before the provincial govern-  
ment tomorrow to oppose the pro-  
posed change in the route of the St.  
John & Quebec Railway south of  
Gagetown. It is expected that the  
meeting will be attended by delega-  
tions from the Boards of Trade of  
Meductic, Woodstock and Gagetown,  
as all of those bodies are opposed  
to any change in the route and will  
act with the Fredericton Board of  
Trade in the matter.

Mr. G. M. McDade, publicity com-  
missioner, is to interview Premier  
Flemming and arrange that the dele-  
gation from the Boards of Trade  
opposing the change in the route  
shall be heard by the government at  
the same time as a delegation from  
St. John, which is to support the  
suggested change.

## WANT NAVY ISLAND BRIDGE.

The St. John people who advocate  
that the St. John & Quebec Railway  
should follow the west bank of the  
St. John River south of Gagetown  
and enter St. John via Fairville, St.  
John West and a Navy Island bridge  
are chiefly residents of St. John West  
who are very desirous of having the  
two sides of St. John Harbor con-  
nected by a bridge. For some years  
there has been a demand in certain  
quarters for the construction of a  
bridge at Navy Island and those who  
have made that demand believe that  
their object could be gained only by  
the choice of the western route.

## DETERMINED OPPOSITION.

The route on the eastern bank of  
the St. John River, which necessitates  
the building of bridges at The  
Mistake and also across the Kenne-  
becasis, is that favored not only by  
the people of the upper part of the  
St. John Valley but also by an in-  
fluential section of the residents of  
King's County. Its advocates claim  
that it gives the shortest haul to  
St. John and also presents fewer  
engineering difficulties than does the  
other which is proposed.

Delegations to support each route  
are expected from St. John in the  
morning.

MORE OFFICIALS  
FOR CIVIC ELECTION  
WILL BE NEEDED

Amendment of 1912 Makes it Nec-  
essary to Have Five Official at Each  
Polling Places—Applications  
Wanted

Under the amendment to the acts  
governing the election of mayor and  
aldermen in the City of Fredericton,  
which was passed by the Legislature  
last year, the number of officials  
which will be necessary to conduct  
the election on March 10 will be in-  
creased and will increase the expense  
of holding it. For the election seven  
polling places have been selected,  
four in No. 1 Division and three in  
No. 2 Division. In addition there are  
to be two polling places, one in each  
division, for the plebiscite on the  
question of the method of selecting a  
police commission. Five officials, in-  
cluding one constable, are to be ap-  
pointed for each of the nine polls.  
The pay for presiding officer, it is  
understood, is to be four dollars and  
of the other two dollars. The total  
cost of holding the election will be  
in the neighborhood of one hundred  
dollars. It is not expected that it  
will be easy to obtain the thirty-six  
polling officials exclusive of the con-  
stables and the aldermen are ready  
to receive applicants.

## EXTRACTS FROM ACT.

1. (1) For the purposes of the  
election of mayor and aldermen the  
City Council of the City of Frederic-  
ton shall fix and determine, each  
year, the number of polling places to  
be held in each of the two electoral  
sub-divisions of the said city and  
shall also appoint a presiding officer,  
poll clerk and two scrutineers and a  
constable to conduct the election at  
each polling place.

2. It shall be the duty of the  
scrutineers so attend at the polling  
place for which they respectively are

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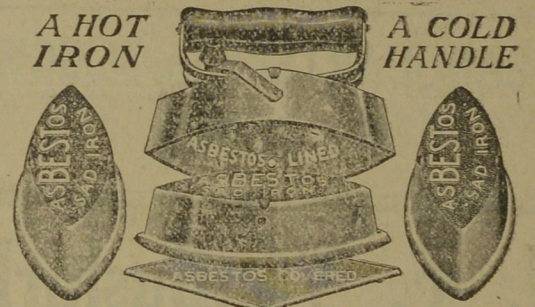
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
