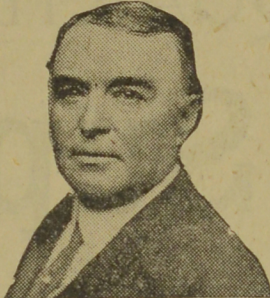

## FREE FIGHT IN COMMONS NARROWLY AVERTED

Ottawa, March 17—The House of Commons has seen many excitable incidents but all old Parliamentarians agree that never was a situation precipitated like that of Saturday night. On no occasion did partisan feeling anywhere approximate to Saturday's display or the chamber become so absolutely rampant. Physical violence would almost certainly have resulted had the final question been put.

It is not infrequently that the house becomes disorderly in a way. A member will make a statement to which the other side objects and there will be loud calls of "Order" and "Sit down." These conditions arise more especially in Committee of Supply but a rowing by the Chairman or the Speaker, as the case may be, is sufficient. Calm is soon restored.

There appears to be no precedent for actual "naming" of a member. Some years ago in the time of Speaker Sutherland Mr. Foster engaged in a wordy duel with the Government over the production of the original documents the Speaker threatened to "name" him.

"Well," asked Mr. Foster, "what will happen then? My name will still be Foster."

Others took a hand in the discussion and the turbulence soon ceased while the Speaker's threat was not carried into execution.

Back in 1898 the late Hon. Clarke Wallace was threatened by Col. Talbot of B. Chasse, for a remark which the latter interpreted as having been disrespectful. Mr. Wallace when the house resumed called attention to the incident, and alluded to his crippled condition. He asked and was assured the protection of the chair.

The session before last Mr. Monk speaking of the Drummond and Arthabasca election denied that disloyal expressions had been used.

"It is a lie," called out Mr. Gauvreau of Temiscouata.

Mr. Monk evidently did not catch the remark but it appeared in Hansard and next day Speaker Marcell directed attention to it, whereupon Mr. Monk arose and calmly invited the member for Temiscouata to repeat the statement outside of the Chamber. Bowing to the Speaker and buttoning up his coat, he went out to the lobbies evidently prepared for a duel.

Speaker Marcell suggested withdrawal of the term, and this was done by Mr. Gauvreau. There was no bloodshed or disfigured physiognomy.

Rows in committee are not uncommon.

## ALBERTA PROVINCIAL TREASURER DIES

Edmonton, Alta., March 17—Shortly after one o'clock on Saturday morning, the Hon. Malcolm McKenzie, Provincial Treasurer, died in the General Hospital here, of peritonitis, after a brief illness, lasting less than a week. He was conscious almost to the last, and his wife and her sister, Miss Henry, of Winnipeg, were at the bedside when the end came.

Mr. McKenzie was in the Legislature last Friday week, and on the following day attended a convention at Charlesholm, where he was again renominated, contracting a severe cold, and being compelled to seek medical treatment on his return to the city. For a few days nothing serious was feared, but on Friday he rapidly grew worse.

Mr. McKenzie was admitted to be one of the most useful members of the Legislature. He came west 25 years ago, and entered upon study of law, first at Calgary and afterwards at Macleod, where for a time he was in partnership with F. W. G. Haultain, now Chief Justice of Saskatchewan. He was about 50 years old, and was born in Kincardine, Bruce County, Ont.
