It is far more desirable in the interest of the party that the subscriptions should be general, coming from every parish in the province, in other words, that there should be a large number of subscribers for small amounts rather than a small number of subscribers for large amounts.

(Moncton Transcript)



The latter railway runs through a por tion of the Province of New Brunswick and it has long been a sore point with the Canadian Pacific management that the reasonable local freight rates on the Intercolonial Railway were contrasted with the excessive freight rates on the C. P. R. in New Bruoswick.

To help the C. P. R. the Government, despite the fact that it claims to have had a one million dollar surplus on the Intercolonial Railway last year, has advanced the min-imum rate to the C. P.
