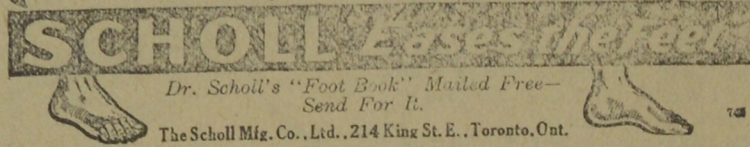

## SANITARY ENGINEERS OF NEW BRUNSWICK IN ANNUAL SESSION

Mayor Hooper and Ald. W. E. Farrell Welcomed Visiting Delegates This Morning—Business Session This Afternoon

The annual convention of the New Brunswick Society of Domestic, Sanitary and Heating Engineers opened this morning at the Church Hall. All the delegates were not present and the proceedings were purely formal and routine. President George Blake of St. John presided and addresses of welcome delivered by His Worship Mayor Hooper and Ald. W. E. Farrell. Pres. Blake replied. A large number of delegates from St. Stephen and vicinity and also from the North Shore arrived here at noon and the first business session of the convention was held this afternoon. It is expected that about forty delegates will be in attendance.

The local master-plumbers will give a banquet Wednesday night in honor of the visitors and it is expected that the convention will complete its business tomorrow.

## LONG DELAYED IMPROVEMENT TO BE MADE AT ARMORY

Company Armories of 71st York Rgt. to be Enlarged and New Room to be Given the Band

The interior of the armory at the corner of Carleton and Campbell Streets will shortly receive some much needed and long delayed repairs. These will be carried out under the direction of Sergt. Ellis of the Royal Canadian Engineers who have been here since spring superintending work at the military property. At present he is engaged with the placing of an iron fence and lighting standards about the Barrack Square. He also will have lighting standards placed about the square of the Officers' Quarters. When these improvements are completed the alteration of the interior of the armory will commence.

At present three Fredericton companies of the 71st York Rgt., the Marysville and Burtons' Corner Companies and regimental staff have accommodation for arms, clothing and equipment in the building. The regimental band has also a practise room there. The intention is to reconstruct the rooms of the second floor at the rear of the building and give the band quarters there. These rooms formerly were occupied by the caretaker and his family. By removing a partition and lowering the floor an excellent practise-room with an ante-room can be obtained. 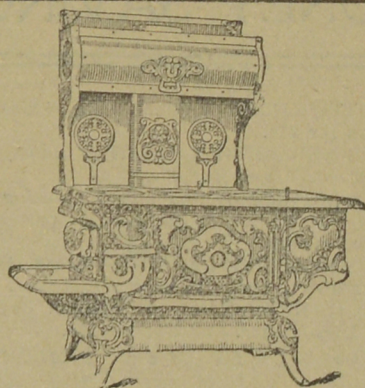
