

## EGG DIET PROVED FAILURE FOR TRAINING COLLEGE ATHLETE

Bodley Pennsylvania's Crack Two-mile Runner Laid up as Result of Diet Experiment

Philadelphia, Feb. 13—Jim Bodley, the University of Pennsylvania middle distance runner, has fallen a martyr to the advancement of medical science.

Bodley is one of the students in the medical department who submitted to a severe test in order to prove that a man would sustain on an egg diet exclusively. As a result Bodley is now laid up and cannot run on Pennsylvania's two-mile relay team in New York tomorrow in the Columbia indoor meet. Coach Haydock has canceled the entry.

Bodley had to go four days without eating. Hot water was the only nourishment allowed during this period, but he reported daily for work on the track. At the end of the four days the men were to eat a dozen eggs daily for six days. Nothing but eggs were allowed, not even salt.

Bodley discovered when he had eaten his second dozen that he was becoming ill, and today he collapsed in the classroom and had to be taken to the hospital.


