## U. S. SENATE TO INVESTIGATE BASEBALL TRUST

Garry Herrmann Invites Investigation--Says Actions of National Commission are Open and Above Board

Washington, April 22--Characterizing organized baseball as "the most audacious and autocratic trust in the country," Representative Gallagher of Illinois, today introduced a resolution for an exhaustive inquiry into the operations of the National Commission by a special committee of Congress, and would also direct the attorney general to investigate the baseball contract system with a view to instituting prosecutions for violation of the Sherman anti-trust law.

The resolution would direct the speaker to appoint a special committee of seven to investigate "the operation and practices of the baseball trust," to ascertain whether unjust discriminations have been practiced in favor of or against players' whether players are now or have been prejudiced, coerced or restrained from the exercise of their just rights to enter into contracts of a fair and equitable nature, and whether such a combination has been effected among baseball magnates throughout the country as would preclude competition and operate in restraint of trade.

Representative Gallagher has been in correspondence regarding his resolution with Horace Fogel, ex-president of the Philadelphia National League team. Fogel in a recent letter to Gallagher, said he could put him on the track to "lay the foundation for the investigation and to subpoena witnesses necessary to easily make out a clear case to turn over to the department of justice for immediate action to burst up the arrogant baseball trust."

### INVITES INVESTIGATION.

Cincinnati, April 22--August Herrmann, chairman of the National Baseball Commission, issued the following statement today regarding the proposed investigation of baseball by Congress:

"This resolution is practically the same as the one introduced by Congressman Gallagher last year. We have nothing whatever to fear. In fact, we rather invite a thorough and exhaustive examination of the whole matter, fully believing that if this is done, nothing but good can result to the game.

"All of the actions of the National Commission are open and above-board. Nothing is concealed. The principles of the National Agreement protect all who are interested in the game--the players, club owners, umpires and officials as well as the patrons.

"Without the provisions of the National Agreement the game could not and would not be the national sport of the country such as it is."
