

SAVING STRANDED LOGS

As the drives get farther down river more logs are found stranded along the shores and logs of other operators mixed with theirs, and the lorses are put to work hauling them into the water again, commonly called sacking. THE FIRST BOOMS.

The first boom was situated where the Glaesier boom is today at what was then called the "short ferry." In the earliest times there were no booms but boats manned by expert river men watched the river day and night from Cliff's Point above Fredericton to the Short Ferry, below, and towed into safety any spars or timber that might be floating down. 
