ROBERT AIKEN'S DRIVE ON MACTNAQUAC OUT WEDNESDAY

Partington Company's Drives on Nashwaak Coming on Well--Tay Drive not Held up--Only Half-Cut of Bank-Logs

Robert Aiken arrived from Machaquac today having successfully brought out the drive on the Mactnaquac stream. The drive contained about 2,000,000 feet and reached the mouth of the stream yesterday. Mr. Aiken says that there was not too much water but that the drive all came out.

NASHWAAK DRIVES

Mr. E. B. Staples, manager for the E. Partington, Pulp & Paper Company at Marysville stated this afternoon that conditions on the Nashwaak were encouraging and the drives on all streams coming along well. There is a fair pitch of water and warm weather is melting the ice and snow with the result that a rise is expected. The water is not so high as it has been in other springs but the prospect is good. Mr. Staples stated further that the report that the drive on the Tay was hung up was not correct that drive coming along all right. About 750,000 feet of lumber is now in the Nashwaak Boom.

FEW BANK LOGS

The run of bank-logs at Springhill has begun but will not assume any great proportions until next week. Two rafts of spruce and one of timber arrived yesterday. Prices are expected to be about \$14 for merchantable logs and \$11 for battens. The run last year totalled from 8,000,000 to 9,000,000 feet. This year it will be about half that.

WATER AT STANDSTILL

The water in the main river fell a few inches since yesterday but now is at a stand still. The warm weather of today and yesterday is expected to bring the water up again. The booms of the St. John River Log Driving Company are ready to receive lumber but none has come into them yet.

DOMINION LICENSE REQUIRED FOR NON-RESIDENT ANGLERS

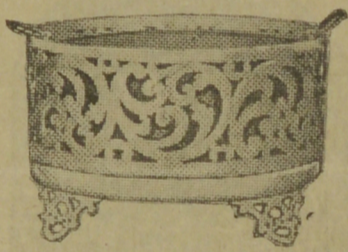
Province Also Imposes Fee on Rod-fishermen From Outside New Brunswick--Confusion Exists in Connection With Jurisdiction

Non-resident anglers in New Brunswick will be confronted by a peculiar situation during the coming angling season, both the province and the Dominion requiring them to take out licenses, the fee for which is five dollars. Confusion exists in regard to the question of jurisdiction over the streams and lakes of the province and will not be removed until the Dominion and the province come to some understanding.

The province has imposed a license fee upon non-resident anglers for several years but the revenue from it has not been large. During the present season this license-fee will be charged whether the angling is
