## NAY ABOLISH THE U. S. COMMERCE COURT

Washington, Jan. 6.—Before the senate Committee on Appropriations a public hearing was begun today on the advisability of making provision in the legislative, executive and judicial appropriation for the maintenance of the Commerce Court. Leading importers and shippers from all sections have been invited to tell the committee what they think of the Commerce Court, which the Democratic House has ordered abolished on March 4, a decision in which the senate during the last session concurred.

It is said, however, that sentiment in the senate has changed considerably with relation to this newest judicial tribunal, and that the vote in the upper chamber may not be the same as last session. Friends of the Commerce Court have been doing much missionary work and are said to have made numerous converts in the senate. Regardless of any action the Committee on Appropriations may take looking to the abolishment of the court, its friends promise a royal battle on the floor of the senate. Democratic leaders of the House declare they will not recede from their position in absolute opposition to continuing the court.

### NOTED EDUCATOR 84 YEARS OLD

Ann Arbor, Mich., Jan. 7.—Dr. J. B. Angell, president emeritus of the University of Michigan and the dean of American educators, entered upon his eighty-fifth year today. Dr. Angell was born in Rhode Island in 1829 and is a graduate of Brown University. Before coming to the University of Michigan in 1871 he had been editor of the Providence Journal for some years and later filled the presidency of the University of Vermont. In the early eighties he served for a time as United States minister in China.

## FIRE LOSSES WERE LIGHT DURING THE PAST YEAR

The following annual report of Mr. H. C. Rutter, chief engineer of the Fire Department, was received last night by the City Council:

To His Worship the Mayor and Members of the City Council:

Gentlemen:—In compliance with the rules governing the Fire Department I have the honor to again submit the annual report of the department for the year ending December 31st, 1912, giving a detailed statement of the fires which have occurred during the year.

The alarms during the year (general and still) numbered seventy-six, only two of which were of more than ordinary proportions, namely, those in the Sharkey Block and Queen Hotel annex. While the losses on these properties were large, the fact that they were not more serious was owing to the good work performed by the members of the department.

There was also a heavy insurance loss at the premises of the F. B. Edgcombe Co., Ltd., but which was almost entirely caused by smoke damage.

The insurance losses for the year total \$14,903.94. The losses on buildings was \$8,326.94 and on contents \$6,577.00. The total insurance risk on building and contents was \$81,550.

The congratulations extended to the members of the department by the citizens for the part taken by them during the recent celebration was much appreciated and I desire to take this opportunity to thank the various visiting delegations who so willingly assisted us on that occasion.

Through the kindness of your honorable body I was given the opportunity during the season to attend

the Massachusetts State Firemen's Convention, which was held in the City of Boston. I had the pleasure of meeting many old fire fighters not only of Massachusetts but of other states and received every kindness at their hands. The members of the Boston department who had in charge the entertaining of the different representatives, did everything possible to make it pleasant as well as giving me the opportunity to inspect their fire-fighting appliances while in action. I also took occasion to visit several towns adjoining Boston, with populations about the same as Fredericton, with the object of comparing conditions, and found them all with three or four stations fully equipped with modern apparatus.

Under the head of recommendations I have again to refer to the necessity of increased protection. I cannot too strongly impress upon the board the matter of adding to our appliances and in this line would recommend the purchase of a motor-driven combination chemical and hose wagon, as well as a more modern and better equipped ladder truck, also motor driven. I will furnish statistics later showing the difference in cost of maintenance of the above machines with the horse-drawn apparatus.

In order to house the above, as well as the present apparatus, I would strongly recommend the erection of two stations, one to be located on King street below Regent, on a lot on which the city has an option. This location would be suitable for the covering of the lower section of the city as well as the business section. The location for the other station can be secured at

a reasonable cost on a vacant lot on King street, above Westmorland, or by its erection on the site of No. 1 Hose Station, this land being the property of the city, either of the latter locations being suitable to cover the upper and back part of the city, also the business section.

I would also recommend the purchase at once of 500 feet of cotton rubber-lined hose to supplement the 3,800 feet at present on hand, some of which has been in use so long that it cannot reasonably be expected to stand the hardest service.

The only addition to the appliances during the year was two three-gallon chemical extinguishers, which have been placed on the ladder truck and which, with the two previously in use, have been of great assistance at small fires.
