Monthly pay and allowances were voted.

MUNICIPAL HOME.

Ald. Moore, chairman of the Municipal Home Committee, reported a balance on hand of \$51.91. On his motion a cheque for \$150.00 was ordered to issue in favor of Commissioner Niles.

Ald. Wilkinson presented the annual report of the Chief Engineer of the Fire Department, which was read, received and ordered to be published in the Blue Book. The report is printed in full elsewhere in this paper.

Ald. Guthrie presented a report from Chief of Police McCollen, on the organization of the force and the number of arrests made during the year. The report was adopted.

Ald. Guthrie, Ald. Wilkinson and Ald. Calder were appointed a legislation committee to confer with the petitioners in the Police Commission matter.

It was decided that on Monday evening members of the Council confer with City Clerk McCready concerning the consolidation of the city by-laws. The city clerk said he expected to present the completely consolidated by-laws at the March meeting.

COMPLAINT RE SNOWPLOUGHING.

Ald. Cruikshank complained concerning the delay which occurred in the snowploughing. He wanted the streets ploughed early in the morning. At the time of the last heavy snow-storm Church street was not ploughed till late in the afternoon. He had complained to the Road Commissioner and had received the curt reply,

"The plough might have been out all night but it wasn't."

He thought an alderman deserved a more courteous reply.

Ald. Calder supported Ald. Cruikshank in this matter. He moved that the snowploughing contractors be informed that they must live up to the terms of their contracts or the city would put on men to do the work.

The motion was carried.

STOCK MARKET

New York, N. Y., Jan. 8.—Prices in the market showed a tendency to sag as the activity of Union Pacific after dissolving its relations with Southern Pacific would enter into a deal for use of Western Pacific as a connection with San Francisco. Although trading was dull in first hour and market developed no pronounced tendency the undertone appeared to be good and the line of least resistance was running in an upward direction. One cause of dullness was interruption in telegraphic connection with the West being practically cut off.

On the motion of Coun. Harry Smith it was decided that in future Jailer Timmins should obtain a receipt for all such fines paid by him to the police magistrate.

BOARD OF HEALTH REPORT

Mr. J. W. Smith, chairman of the County Board of Health, presented his report for the year. He reported an expenditure of \$517 for the year and a balance on hand of \$61. He asked for a grant of \$500 for Board of Health purposes during 1913.

In response to Coun. Hugh Smith and Coun. Clarence Grant of Canterbury Mr. Smith made some explanation with regard to expenditure in connection with a smallpox case at Meductic. One item was \$60 for Dr. Gardner and \$70 for goods supplied by Mr. Olts of Meductic. Mr. Olts' bill had not been made out satisfactorily and had been returned to him. They had been laid before the board but had not been settled as Mr. Olts had never given explanation required concerning the bill.

Coun. Merrithew asked if Benjamin Gilbert had worked in his blacksmith shop when his house had been under quarantine.

Mr. Smith stated that he had sent placards and supplied the house was under quarantine. He did not know about the other matter.

INDIAN MATTER

Coun. Essensa asked Mr. Smith if he had made any effort to recover any of the \$475 paid out for the support of the Indians of the St. Mary's Reserve while they were under smallpox quarantine. Coun. Essensa thought that as a provincial appointee he should call upon the Provincial Government and not the Municipal Council for help in that matter.

Mr. Smith said the matter had been brought before Mr. Crocket and he thought that gentleman was going to take it up at Ottawa. Hon. Mr. Smith had also been approached but had stated he was not exactly up on the question as to who was to pay the bill.

On motion of Coun. Nall the council then adjourned until 10.30 a. m. today.

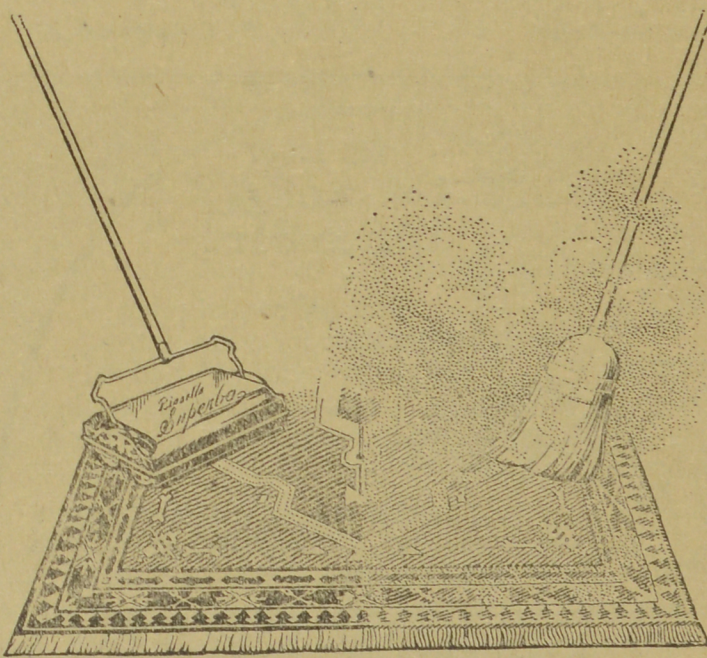
