SOME FAKE CURES AND MEDICAL QUACKS

(The Indiana Catholic)

There is no State in the Union so victimized by fake medical advertisements as Indiana and the daily press of the State opens its columns to any and every impostor who has the money to spread his literature in their pages to deceive and humbug the too credulous public.

These unscrupulous advertising quacks who prey on the afflicted and diseased portion of the population, have done untold harm; sent thousands to untimely graves and bred dope fiends in every community with their poisonous nostrums.

The Indiana Catholic, and we are happy to say the Catholic press generally, has refused to take "cure-all" ads., such as are accepted by the daily press in our great cities. We have in our office the evidence of our refusal to accept these contracts. No loan shark is half as pernicious as is the medical faker, yet papers that denounce the "loan shark" unblushingly print page "ads." from alleged doctors whom they know to be impostors. Take the daily papers that print the "Three-day Cure" for the drug habit or alcoholism.

Any well-informed person knows that it is impossible to cure the drug habit in three days, or to cure inebriety in three days. The highest scientific authorities in the world bear out this contention. The drug habit or alcoholism so impairs the tissues and undermines the constitution that it requires at least thirty days, if not longer, to eliminate the poisons from the system.

An intoxicated man can be made perfectly sober in much less time than three days, but a victim of the habit can not be cured in anything like three days. And yet the public reads in the daily papers from day to day the scare head announcements about a "three-day cure."

The poor, benighted victim reads, or his friends read, the "ad." in the local daily organ of public morality, and civic righteousness and he parts with his money in large chunks, and often parts with more than his money. He undergoes a drug treatment which leaves his body and mind wrecked and in ninety-nine cases out of a hundred he lapses into the old condition, only a worse condition as a result of the delusive and seductive "ad." he read about a quick cure.

The Legislature of Indiana, at its next session, should take steps to stamp out fake medical advertisers, and fake cures in Indiana. They now hold high carnival in this State, and during their reign in our midst they have filled graveyards and insane asylums with unfortunate who, if properly and scientifically treated, would be alive and at home with their families. The loan shark evil is no such an evil as the fake cure evil.

ing to do for the Grand Trunk. This proposition, which would have saved the people of Canada \$15,000,000 in cash and still given the use of the money to Mackenzie & Mann was turned down by the government, 52-36.

Four separate times efforts were made by the Liberals to either change this \$15,000,000 gift into a loan, or else attach such conditions to the gift that the people would secure some compensation by way of reduced rates or increased control over better service. Four times Mr. Borden and his followers arose en masse to express their determination that the \$15,000,000 of the peoples' taxes should be handed over to Mackenzie & Mann without the slightest condition or return.

If it is good business to get something in return for the people's money then the Liberals were trying to do good business for the people. If it is good business to make huge gifts of the peoples' money to enormously wealthy railway magates and refuse to attach the slightest condition thereto (except the understood condition that the recipients shall not forget the financial needs of the government when times come along) then the Borden government was carrying on good business.

The facts are so clearly blazoned on parliamentary records that when the time comes the people whose money has been so recklessly given away will be easily able to understand and decide the issue. After that decision is given, Canada will return to common sense, and under Liberal government, public money will not be handed out without some commensurate public advantage.

DOG TAXES

The attention of owners of dogs within the City limits is directed to the following provisions of the City By-law relating to dogs:—

"Every owner of a dog shall register such dog at the office of the City Treasurer on or before the FIRST DAY OF AUGUST in each year the tax or fee for each registration shall be ONE DOLLAR, which must be paid to the City Treasurer before registration."

"The owner of any male dog who has not registered it on or before the first day of August as aforesaid may register such dog at any time up to the first day of September next succeeding on payment to the City Treasurer a tax or fee of TWO DOLLARS; but if such registration is not made until after the first day of September and previous to the first day of January next succeeding the tax or fee for such registration shall be THREE DOLLARS."

The tax or fee for female dogs is fixed at FOUR DOLLARS if not registered before August first and at FIVE DOLLARS afterwards. City Hall, G. R. PERKINS, July 24, 1913 City Treasurer 307—July 26.

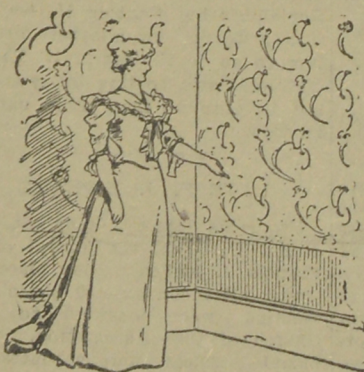
