

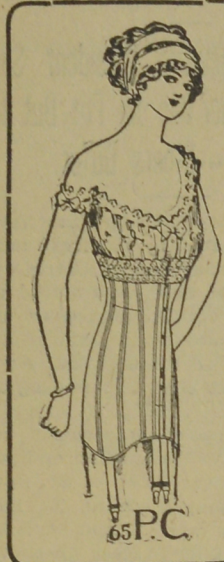

**POLITICAL ABUSE
FROM OPPONENTS**

Canada is not without experts in
the art of abusing their political
opponents, says the London Adver-
tiser. Sir Wilfrid is a rebel; Sir
George is a hypocrite; Mr. Pugsley
is a bully; and so on. If a grit is
not a fool, he must be a rogue, and
if he is not a rogue, he must be a
fool. We are used to that sort of
thing. We may not admit the
judgment or the manners behind
this in billings gate, but hard words
break no bones, and are very poor
arguments. So we can allow war-
fare of this kind to be justified on
the same principle that Dr. Watts
justified improprieties in the con-
versation of cats and dogs, because
it is their nature to.

But the most ardent admirer of
Canadian Toryism must admit
that it cannot reach to the stand-
ard of the same party in England.
The stream of ribald abuse poured
out on the British Premier and his
Chancellor of the Exchequer exceeds
anything attempted as yet in Can-
ada. Especially has Mr. Lloyd
George been made the recipient of
the most foul-mouthed aspersion.
Nor is this confined to the Tory
lords and ladies, some of the cler-
gy have shown themselves very pro-
ficient in the art of vituperation.
One of the most abusing exhibitions
appears in the Devon and Exeter Ga-
zette. At a bazaar in aid of the
church school a life-size figure of the
Chancellor was provided and every-
one who paid a half-penny had the
privilege of giving it a kick. At this
privilege yielded \$40, there must
have been at least 4000 kicks bestow-
ed on the counterfeit presentation of
a British cabinet minister. It is ad-
mitted that this mode of kicking or
being kicked by proxy is not a very
heroic achievement, but it is recom-
mended to other parishes desiring to
raise money as a very humorous part
of the program which would be like-
ly to attract many people who would
like to kick Mr. George, but do not
wish to take the risk of doing it per-
sonally. A correspondent of the
Church Times, understood to be a
clergyman, and who speaks of Mr.
George as "the Welsh rat-
catcher," would doubtless consider
this one way of getting even with
the obnoxious person.

And this is the party that in Eng-
land has always boasted that it was
the gentlemen's party—the party of
the cultured, upper classes. We may
be bad enough in Canada, but we are
satisfied that very few Canadian Con-
servatives can get down to this
standard. And we are sure that even
the most pronounced Tory among
clergymen would not approve of a
church raising money by kicking an
Sir Wilfrid at a cent for a
kick.
