LUMBER CUT IS SMALLEST IN YEARS

(Montreal Star)
The exceptional mildness which has distinguished the winter of 1912-1913 has had a marked effect on the lumbering operations in the province of St. John both for good and for ill.

In the northern section of the headwaters of the St. John the Miramichi the Restigouche and the Nepisiguit where the average snowfall of about six feet has always proved a handicap to the operators this year's fall of two and a half feet has provided unexcelled conditions for the loggers.

In the southern part of the province in the district between Fredericton and the Bay of Fundy, where there is seldom more than enough snow, the mild winter and the late arrival and early departure of the snow has played havoc with the operations. The lumbermen in this section usually are able to depend on at least six weeks of good sledding weather but this year they only had three, the snow disappearing almost entirely about a fortnight ago.

The cut in the northern section of the province will be about average, while that of the southern section will show a falling off. The cut at the head of the St. John river will be well up to the average but the quantity of logs handled in the booms at Fredericton and rafted to St. John will be smaller than for many years. The estimate for this year is 65 million feet while last year it was 95 million and the previous year about 100 million. The reason for this is partly due to the fact that while there are two mills less, sawing at St. John than in other years, the mills on the upper reaches which transport the sawn lumber to the American market by rail are handling more than ever.

Another reason for the difference was that last year the booms contained not only the full winter's cut, but a large quantity of logs which had been hung up during the previous spring. On the north shore the recently built International Railway is proving an important factor in the lumbering operations. Running through a virgin country, which was previously difficult or impossible of access to the lumbermen, it has thrown open immense areas to the axe of the loggers and advantage is being taken of this opportunity to a greater extent each year. Last year about 20 millions and lumber products were brought out over this road and this year the amount will be trebled. As logging operations are still being continued in some of the northern sections it is too early to estimate the total output for the province, but the indications are that it will be at least up to the average, in spite of unfavorable conditions in the southern part of the province. The early warm spell, which has caused the disappearance of most of the snow, may be detrimental if followed by colder weather.

Reports from Nova Scotia indicate an average season. In some places the cut has been smaller than usual, but this has been balanced by the larger cut in other sections of the province. The market conditions are favorable in one direction, but not encouraging in another.

Mr. Wm. McKay has returned to the West, accompanied by his mother who intends spending a few months there.

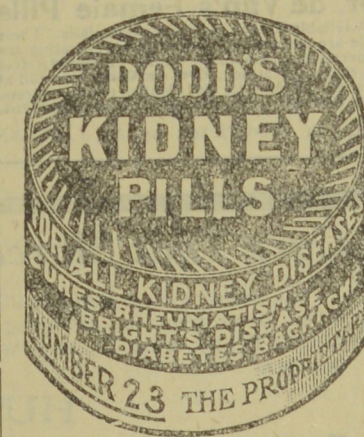
Miss R. Donahoe is spending Easter with relatives in Fredericton Junction.
