## TO OUTFIT WHOLE CLUB IN COTTON LEAGUE

Topsy Hartsel Makes Curious Agreement With Pensacola Club---Will Furnish Even the Manager

Topsy Hartsel, former star outfielder of the Philadelphia Athletics, and at present successful manager of the Toledo team in the American Association, has sprung another baseball innovation. He has undertaken—presumably for a commission in money or players—to outfit the Pensacola Club of the Cotton States League with a full line of talent. Topsy will furnish all the players and select a manager. That is going somewhat and it will be worth while noting how the scheme pans out.

## BASEBALL NOTES

Umpire "Silk" O'Loughlin, of the American League is working out with the Rochester team at Anniston, Ala. President Frank Farrell of the New York Americans will establish a permanent training camp in Bermuda for his Yankees.

Jesse Tennehill, the veteran major league pitcher has been engaged as manager of the Covington, Ky., team in the new Federal League.

Manager Callahan of the White Sox has released infielder Ernie Johnson to the Los Angeles Pacific Coast League Club.

Pitcher Ray Keating of the Lawrence, Mass., star is making a name for himself with the New York American and will no doubt become a regular. Monte Cross, who is engaged in the scrap iron business in Philadelphia has organized a semi-professional baseball team to be called the "Scrap Iron Players."

By the way they are playing against minor league outfits the Athletics and the Giants seem to have it on the other big leaguers in the way of condition.

Adding Jimmy Adams' 6 feet 5 1/2 inches to Carl Wellman's 6 feet 7 inches, the St. Louis Browns have over thirteen feet of pitching material in the two men.

There is talk of a spring series between the Cubs and the Athletics next year. Both teams will train at Florida, the Athletics at Jacksonville and the Cubs at Tampa.

Chung, a Chinese student is one of the most promising ball players among the Columbia University candidates. He is a second baseman and a good hitter.

Reports from the Detroit Tigers' training trip have it that Bobby Veach is doing better work than either Davy Jones or Matty McIntyre, his predecessors.

Two of the Cincinnati regulars, pitcher Rube Benton and infielder Dick Egan are on the hospital list. Rube has a severe cold and Dick is nursing a lame ankle.

Addie Collins, of the Athletics, has realized his fondest hopes. In a recent game Eddie clouted a home run with the bases filled and he can now rest on his laurels.

The Boston Red Sox have shipped pitcher Joe Martin back to the Beaumont club of the Texas League, and shortstop Scott, last year with Youngstown to the Indianapolis club.

Before he became a ball player, Teddy Cather, of the Cardinals, worked at the plumbing and barbing trades, as a druggist, a roller-skating instructor and as an asbestos coverer in a locomotive work.

The Pittsburgh Club insists on a temperance clause in the contracts with the Pirate players; the Cubs limit their men to one beer a day, while no restrictions have been put on the Boston Red Sox.

The Milwaukee Club has signed pitcher Harold Juul, son of State Senator Neils Juul, of Illinois. Pitching for the Calumet (Mich.) team last season, Juul, who is 18 years old, won 18 and lost 8 games.

If he can induce an American League team to stand half of the training expenses and to do their Spring practice work with the Boston Braves, Manager George Stallings is willing to build a training camp at his plantation in Georgia.

Marvin Peasley, who was the sensation of the New Brunswick League pitching staff several years ago and was drafted for the big league is to play with Winnipeg again this season. The western team is to start practice on April 6.

Manover, N. H., March 31—Rain spoiled the plans today for the baseball squad. It was hoped that a real line could be had on the outfielders, who are new men. Morey and Lavin, former Greater Boston twirlers, had been picked to do the firing in a game of nine innings.

The men who will make the southern trip, to start April 9, are known with the exception of one outfielder and two infielders, with a lively battle going on for these places. Morey, Hallett, Lavin and Curtis, pitchers, will make the trip, also Kimball, Roland, Lowe, Donahue, Mernstein, Bennett and Cook, infielders, and Loudon, Twitchell, Sullivan and Hogsett, outfielders. Eight of this number come from the vicinity of Boston and five are varsity football players, including both the captain of last year's and next year's football team.

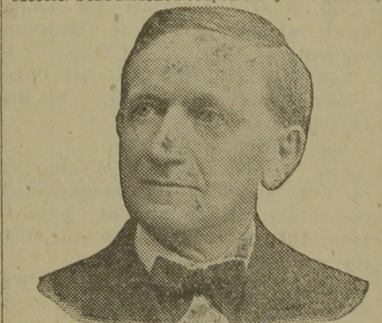

Combined New Westminster-Vancouver Team Beat Quebec 9 to 3 in Easy Style

Vancouver, April 1—The combined Vancouver-New Westminster team cut dizzy circles around the Quebec Stanley Cup team in Vancouver. The final score was 9 to 3. The game was brilliant in spots at times, bordering on the sensational and the goalkeepers showed wonderful class, but the game was marred by dirty playing, something that had not made its appearance out here until last night's game. ## JUBILEE OF MOST FAMOUS GAMBLING HELL

Monte Carlo, March 31—Monte Carlo, the world's most famous—or infamous—gilded gambling heli, will today round out a half-century of existence. M. Francois Blanc, the father of Monte Carlo, bought the property fifty years ago today, March 31, 1863, and organized the Societe des Bains de Mer, the official title of the gaming establishment called the Casino. Gradually magnificent buildings rose on sites that from the beginning of time had been occupied only by a tangled jungle of trees and shrubbery. Before M. Blanc dreamed his dream, the Genoese princely house of Grimaldi, rulers of Monaco since the tenth century, had held a barren honor and governed a barren land. Two years before the beginning of Monte Carlo the ruling prince had been forced by debts to cede the communes of Mentone and Roquebrune to France, receiving therefor the sum of 4,000,000 francs. The country sold was the principal part of the principality, and Monaco seemed doomed to vanish from the map of Europe. The founding of the gambling hell saved the day, and the present ruler is one of the wealthiest princes of Europe, sharing in the spoils won from those who woo the goddess of chance. Monaco has no agriculture, no industries of any kind except those dependent on the entertainment and fleeing of tourists from all over the world.

M. Francois Blanc, having laid the foundation of the world's greatest gaming house, was called to his reward and in 1877 was succeeded by his son, M. Camille Blanc, who placed the institution on an even firmer basis of prosperity. The original investment of the founder in the Societe des Bains de Mer was 1,700,000 francs. Today the Casino alone is valued at 900,000,000 francs, while millions more are invested in immensely profitable hotels, shops and villas. The Prince of Monaco is supposed to be worth at least a hundred million francs, all derived from his share of gambling, profits and

From Boston writes Mr. William Gill to the Toronto Globe to protest against the extravagant and misleading announcements made in connection with every Canadian hockey team which visits that city—including the advertising of the Winnipeg All-Stars as the Allan Cup team. He concludes:

"Boston is the most duped town of hockey suckers in the world—where they play each week for the world's championship on a rink 225 feet long with two periods of 20 or 25 minutes, thus putting the one team at a great disadvantage. The Winnipeg who by silence lend themselves to the above-mentioned deception deserve to be licked. Boston papers will not publish any protests whatever, so we must look to Canadian dailies for an explanation of the farical 'championships' being decided here.

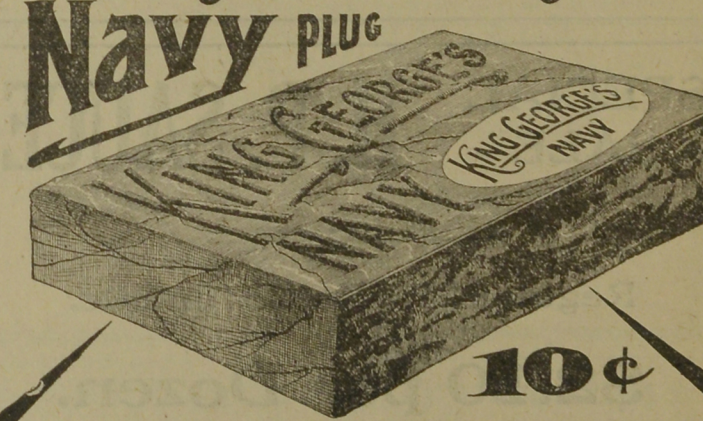

vast amounts paid for the renewal of the concessions. The people of Monaco pay no taxes, all the expenses of police protection being paid by the "Societe." The owners of the gambling house are really in charge of the government of Monaco, and the Prince is ruler in name only. The profits from the Casino can only be guessed at, but they are believed to be over forty million francs a year. The Societe des Bains de Mer enjoys the exclusive exploitation of gambling within the principality, and for this privilege it not only pays large sums to the Prince, but provides the water service, looks after the sanitation, lights the streets, roads and gardens, and in general plays the benevolent despot over Monte Carlo. All of the newspapers receive subsidies from the society, and, needless to say, print nothing objectionable to that organization. A search of the files of Monaco papers for half a century would probably not reveal a single account of a suicide—and yet self-destruction, under the most sensational circumstances, is of almost daily occurrence in Monte Carlo. Indeed, the local editors might defend themselves by saying that suicide is so common as not to come within the definition of "news."
