Mrs. H. R. Babbitt of Fredericton

Halifax, Aug. 18—Nova Scotia regained the tennis laurels lost at Rothesay, N.B., last year when every one of the five events in the Maritime tournament was captured by her representatives today. Three of the matches were very close, the men's singles and doubles each going to five sets and the mixed doubles requiring three sets and the play generally was very interesting. There was a big crowd on the South End Club courts all day, this event concluding the eight days of championship events here.

The scores in the matches were: Challenge round, Nova Scotia, mixed doubles—Miss Frances Lydiard, title holder for two years, and W. N. Rice, Sydney Mines, defeated the challengers, Miss Silver and A. C. Wiswell, South End, 6-2, 1-6, 6-0. Maritime tournament, ladies' doubles—Miss Owen and Miss Marshall, Nova Scotia, defeated Mrs. Babbitt and Miss Schofield, New Brunswick, 6-4, 6-4.

**Dave Morey Had Border Team Guessing "Rip" McPhee Was Batted Hard by Fredericton--St. John Won From Bangor by Close Score--St. Croix Here Today--Bangor Here Wednesday and Thursday**

The Pets took another grip on the first position in the league, beating St. Croix 13 to 4 yesterday. The teams play again this afternoon and the Saints have a most uncomfortable way of turning the tables after dropping a game, so an interesting game may be looked for. If the Pets win today it will be the tenth consecutive victory.

The game yesterday was nothing extraordinary. St. Croix played loosely in the field and had streaks of effective batting. Fredericton fielded in good style and batted hard. The eighth inning was where St. Croix went to pieces. Up to that time Fredericton was leading by a small margin and the game was fairly close and interesting. After the balloon ascension in the eighth, Fredericton had increased the lead by six runs.

Stories of sales of St. Croix players are said to be incorrect. McPherson, who was reported by Bangor papers to have been sold to the Lynn New England League Club, is still with St. Croix. Tetrault, who was reported sold to the Portland Club of the New England League, has taken French leave. He claims that he is a free agent, the club being in arrears to him as far as salary is concerned and that making him a free agent.

#### GAME IN DETAIL.

Fredericton scored mainly through batting "Rip" McPhee yesterday touching him for sixteen hits. In the first three hits and two errors gave the Pets three runs. In the third Ganley hit a three-bagger and scored on Duggan's hit. In the fifth there was another. Keaney was caught playing off third but Ganley who had hit safely, took second on the putout. He stole third and scored on P. J. Duggan's sacrifice fly. In the sixth a couple of hits and an error by Vanoes scored Callahan. Keaney made it 7 to 4 in the seventh by hitting a two-bagger, going to third on a sacrifice hit by Ganley and scoring on another sacrifice fly by Duggan.

In the eighth Fredericton found McPhee for five hits, one for two bases. There were also a couple of errors and six runs came in.

St. Croix did all the damage in one inning, the second. Ed Phelan started to pitch for the Pets but was taken out in the second with none out, three hits off him and one run scored. Dave Morey finished the game. In the balance of the inning St. Croix had a two-bagger and two singles off Dave. After that he had them up a tree, allowing but one hit. The box score follows:

Donovan, a new pitcher imported from Boston and who arrived in the city yesterday morning, was on the mound for the local team and made a good showing, keeping the Bangors down to seven hits. He struck out three men and did not present one with a base on balls. He also managed to hit two singles and made one of the four runs gathered in by his team. Another new player for the Marathons is Lee, who played in centre-field and he also made a good showing, taking four chances hit out to his garden and one of these fly balls was a most difficult one, being hit nearly to the fence. The two men proved a valuable addition to the team. Wallace was the Bangor pitcher and this little iron man also worked well, only seven hits being made off his delivery. Like his opponent, he struck out three men. It was a pitchers' battle with Donovan having but little over Wallace. That the game did not stretch into an extra inning battle was not the fault of Wallace but the finish was a quick one and was boot away by the shortstop and third baseman.

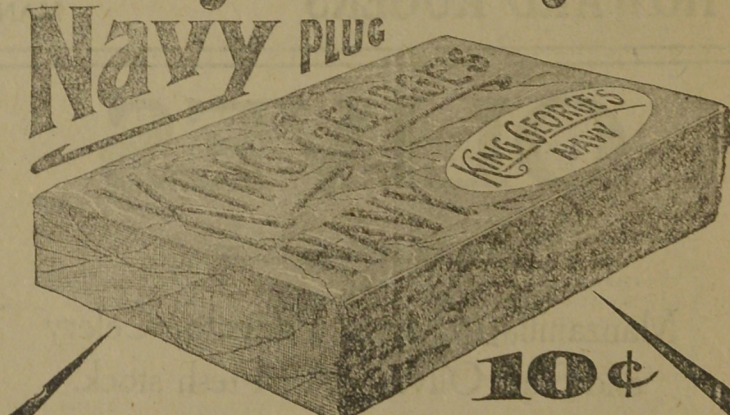
