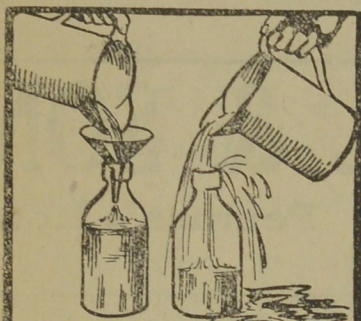

DOWN TOWNERS HAVE AN EYE FOR THE BEAUTIFUL

Dear Sir,—Quite a little stroke of gardening and other improvements been going on for several weeks in the East end of the city. The Cathedral grounds have been cleaned up, the walks raked, edges of grass trimmed, etc. The Deanery grounds have been made more spacious or enlarged by removing an old fence, old bricks, etc., on the vacant lot added. It has been ploughed and planted with potatoes, vegetables and with a hot bed for cucumbers and melons. The Very Rev. Dean Schofield with his estimable wife are becoming quite experts in gardening. The Dean purposes giving the school children a treat during the summer on the newly improved lawn and under those majestic trees.

His Lordship Bishop Richardson has been engaged for several weeks planting beds of roses and annual and perennial roots, two cases came from London, Ont. New walks of cinders have been laid on the East and South sides of the residence and a strawberry patch and new shrubs on the North side next the street. A neat little low fence designed by His Lordship of small wooden posts with wire stretched, and in the garden proper the children's little gardens are outlined with rustic stones. The little conservatory is always looking gay with seasonable flowers. We will conclude that His Lordship is full of artistic ideas in the gardening art. Miss Edith Gregory who is now in the west B.C., has the next lot to the Bishop's and has a man preparing and planting vegetables and flowers under the direction of Mrs. Albert J. Gregory.

Mr. Hawkins of the Bank of Montreal is making a change in the garden lot. He proposes taking the lower end for a poultry yard moving the roses, etc., this way. He has got a fine Jersey cow has ordered several trees to fill vacancies on the lawn front.

The Messrs Bebbington have made quite a change in their front and back, raising and grading and removing an old fence terracing on a small scale resowing lawn grass etc.

Mr. B. C. Foster, Mr. R. Hanson and G. A. Inch on Church Street have their lawns well kept and are experts in vegetable culture. Experts claim that Mr. Foster trains his vines round the windows and prunes them as no one but a master in the art could do. The Messrs Bebbington claim that they know how to raise good lettuce, radish and all other garden truck in great quantity having a contract with a St. John Factory for some five or six tons of cauliflower and cucumbers grown on their Howie farm besides supplying their local trade.

I omitted in connection with vines you may incorporate that it is said that a garden without a vine is like a home without a child. His Lordship has the passion vine, the canary creeper and cobra scandens and the Virginia creeper. Col. Loggie also has his vines trained in an orderly manner also Mr. John Neill, Church Street, Dr. T. C. Allen, R. Randolph, Dr. Crockett's beautiful residences all are the admiration of all visitors.

THEODORE ROOSEVELT DENIES DRUNKENNESS

Marquette, Mich., May 27.—Theodore Roosevelt took the witness stand today in his libel suit against George A. Newett, who in an editorial in his newspaper, "The Iron Ore" charged him with drunkenness. The former president entered a denial. He admitted using light wines with his meals but never touched strong liquors except on advice of his physician or after great exposure. He said he does not smoke or touch beer.

The leading points in his testimony may be quoted as follows: "I am not a total abstainer."

"I have never drunk a highball or a cocktail in my life."

"I do not smoke and I do not drink beer and I do not drink red wine."

"I have never drunk whiskey or brandy except when the doctor prescribed it, or possibly on some occasion after great exposure when I was chilled through."

"The only wines I have drunk have been white wines, Madeira, Champagne or occasionally a glass of sherry."

"At home at dinner I often drink a glass or two of white wine."

"At public dinners I sometimes drink a glass of champagne or perhaps two. On an average I may drink one glass of champagne a month."

BERTHS ON IMPERATOR ARE ALL SPOKEN FOR

Berlin, May 28.—Officials of the Hamburg-American Line brand as "utterly nonsensical" the stories afloat in reference to serious constructional shortcomings of the Imperator. It is stated that her mechanical trials are now completed, and that arrangements for her scheduled maiden trip to New York on June 11 have been definitely made.

On the last trial trip to the Norwegian coast, on which Herr Ballin and other directors of the line were passengers, the Imperator is said to have developed a speed of twenty-three knots without having had to use forced draught.

The Imperator was thrown open for public inspection in the harbor of Cuxhaven today, and was visited by 3,000 persons, who were permitted to roam about the leviathan at will.

For the first eastbound sailing from New York on June 25 there is not one berth obtainable. The ship will arrive in Europe with more than 2,000 first and second cabin passengers and no less than four full captains in command, headed by Capt. Ruser, well known as the former commander of the Kaiserin Augusta Victoria, who will pilot the giantess across the Atlantic with the rank of Vice-Admiral of the Hamburg-American fleet.

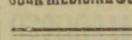

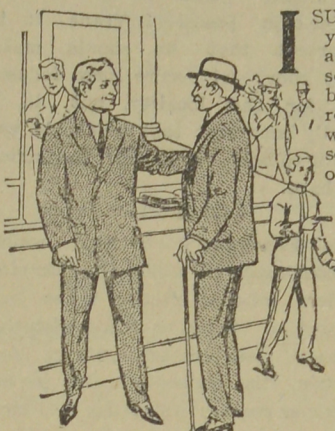
