have got through in spite of the
weather but for the sickening of a
second companion, Captain Bates,
and a shortage of fuel in our depots
for which I cannot account and finally
but for the storm which has fallen
on us within eleven miles of this
depot, at which we hoped to secure
the final supplies.Surely misfortune could scarcely
have exceeded this last blow. We
arrived within eleven miles of our
old One Ton Camp with fuel for one
hot meal and food for two days.For four days we have been unable
to leave the tent, a gale blowing
about us.We are weak, writing is difficult,
but for my own sake I do not regret
this journey, which has shown that
Englishmen can endure hardships,
help one another and meet death
with as great a fortitude as ever in
the past.We book risks—we know we book
them.Things have come out against us
and therefore we have no cause for
complaint, but bow to the will of
Providence, determined still to do
our best to the last.**AN APPEAL TO ENGLAND.**But if we have been willing to give
our lives to this enterprise, which is
for the honor of our country, I ap-
peal to our countrymen to see that
those who depend on us are properly
cared for.Had we lived I should have had a
tale to tell of the hardihood, endur-
ance and courage of my companions,
which would have stirred the heart
of every Englishman.These rough notes and our dead
bodies must tell the tale but surely,
surely a great, rich country like
ours will see that those who are de-
pendent upon us are properly provid-
ed for.(Signed) **R. SCOTT.**

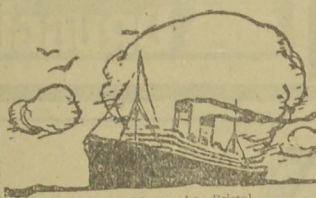

Nobody can read Scott's last
words without a profound feeling of
admiration and compassion and with-
out a strong sense of duty to carry
out the wish this touching message
contains. The British government
has taken immediate action and a
pension of £200 has been granted to
Captain Scott's widow and relief
funds have been opened in nearly
every part of the British dominions
to assist those dependent on the men
who so nobly and gallantly gave
their lives to their country. Captain
Scott leaves a widow and one son,
Peter, aged three years, to mourn
his loss. It was one of the most path-
etic features of this great tragedy
that Mrs. Scott was in mid-ocean
on her way to New Zealand to meet
her husband when she got the ter-
rible news, believing him to be safe
and well, whereas he and his band
of heroes had been lying dead for

DIES SUDDENLY**

(St. John Telegraph.)

Death came with shocking sudden-
ness to Dr. George U. Hay, editor of
The Educational Review, early
last evening. The news of his pas-
sing soon circulated over the city
and his great number of friends
heard it with profound regret. He
was taken ill at six o'clock and at
nine o'clock he was dead.Dr. Hay, who was in his seventieth
year, was an educationist of repute
and one of the best known men in
New Brunswick. Articles from his
pen, which appeared in The Educa-
tional Review, were always enjoyed
and he was a speaker of ability.
Kindly and courteous always, he
made many friends and few enemies,
and he always took a very active
part in any movement for the good
of the community. His wife sur-
vives.Dr. Hay was about town yesterday
afternoon as usual. At dinner time
he was taken ill and although he did
not consider it anything of a dan-
gerous character he walked over to
the office of Dr. W. W. White and
consulted the physician. A few min-
utes later he returned home a block
or two away. Soon after that he
became seriously ill and Dr. White
was summoned at once. Everything
possible was done for him but he
passed away at nine o'clock. Heart
disease was the cause of death. His
brother, Thomas L. Hay, died very
recently.George Upham Hay was born at
Norton, N.B., June 18, 1843. He was
the son of William and Eliza H.
Hay, who were of Loyalist descent.
He received his education in the pro-
vincial schools, the Illinois Wesleyan
University, from which he received a
degree of Ph.B., and Acadia Univer-
sity, which gave him the degree of
M.A. in 1894 and D.Sc. in 1901.He married in 1876 Miss Frances
Annetta Hartt, who has been a vice-
president of the Ladies' Auxiliary of
the Natural History Society of St.
John.He was originally a journalist but
later became an educationist and was
principal of the Victoria High school
St. John, for ten years. In 1887 he,
with Dr. A. H. Mackay, established
The Educational Review and during
the last few years he has been both
editor and manager of that publica-

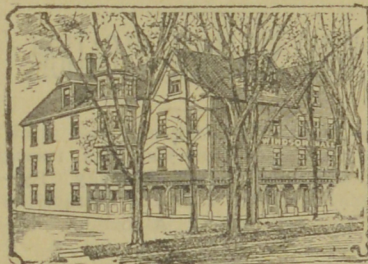

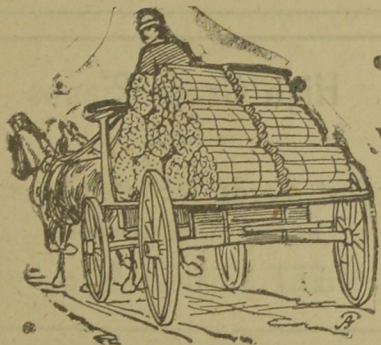
