"SMOKY" JOE WOOD OUT OF BUSINESS WITH SPRAINED THUMB

Expected That He Will be Laid
Aside for Three Weeks or a
Month

Washington, April 24—"Smoky Joe" Wood, Boston's champion pitcher, may be out of the game for three weeks or a month.

He will certainly be unable to play this week. The injury to his thumb, while not serious, is of such a nature however, that if he tries to use his pitching hand before it is healed his twirling may be affected all season, to the great loss of the world's champions.

The discovery was made today by a surgeon, who examined Wood. While Joe's thumb is only helpless from a bad sprain, it is believed that the injury is almost as bad as if the member had been broken. A Washington physician examined Wood's thumb at his hotel and then told him to nurse it along till the pain from pressure had entirely disappeared.

Manager Stahl said after the examination that there is no need of hurrying Joe back into the game and taking any chances of injuring him permanently.

"He will be strictly all right," said Stahl, "when he goes back into the game and I only regret we will not be able to use him against Johnson, as I know that would be a double attraction for the Washington fans."

TY COBB IN SPOTLIGHT OF BASEBALL AT PRESENT

Several Stories Current
About Situation Be-
tween Him and Detroit
Club--Reported That
He has Signed Contract
Already--Salary of \$12,
500 with Bonuses

Detroit, Mich., April 24—Ty Cobb, the Tiger slugger, reaches here today from his Augusta, Ga., home, and it is said he will sign a contract that calls for a straight salary of \$12,500 and bonuses.

This was the information that came today from a person close to the Detroit management, and who is said to be thoroughly conversant with the dickering that has been going on between Cobb and President Navin in the past few days.

The \$12,500 salary is Navin's original offer. Cobb demanded \$10,000. The bonuses, if earned, will give Cobb additional money for all hits, stolen bases and runs over a certain total, and will make his income approximately \$15,000.

ANOTHER STORY

Detroit, April 24—Tyrus Cobb will arrive in Detroit either Thursday or Friday for a conference with President Frank Navin, of the Tigers. Cobb is willing to make concessions to the Tiger boss in regard to some of the difficulties which have been holding the two apart, and it is understood Navin will also concede several disputed points to reach an amicable agreement with the slugging outfielder.

These facts were gathered today from a source apparently reliable. Cobb is now in Atlanta (Ga.), but his intimate friends here claim to have received word that he would leave for Detroit either today or tomorrow. Friends of both Cobb and Navin predicted that the Georgian would make his 1913 appearance in a Tiger uniform within a week.

RATHER INCONSISTENT.

New York, April 24—Ty Cobb's refusal to report for duty with the Detroit club because among other things he demands an increase in his salary to \$15,000, has brought publicity to the fact here that Cobb is one of the advisory board of the baseball players' fraternity.

The significance of this is discussed in baseball circles as having an important bearing on the principles of the fraternity, for when the protection union of baseball players was organized last October, one of the principal objects in view was declared to be the arbitration of disputes over salaries between players and their employers. An advisory board was appointed to handle just such cases and Cobb was named as one of the six members to serve in this capacity. So far as known, however, the advisory board has made no overtures for arbitration of this matter, in which one of its own

Frank Chance, the Peerless Leader of the New Yorks, broke into the big show on April 23, 1898, being an added starter in the game against Louisville. He caught Clark Griffith (now manager of the Washington team) and his record is represented in the box score by a string of ciphers.

The shortest baseball game on record was played at Atlanta, Ga., on September 17, 1910 on the last day of the Southern League championship race, when the Atlanta and Mobile teams played a full nine-inning game in 32 minutes.

SITUATION RE PLAYING GROUNDS IS BRIGHTER

New York, April 22—The celebration of the Hebrew Feast of Pesach, or the Passover, was begun at sunset last evening by the Jewish people throughout the world. The celebration continues for eight days, though only the first two days and the last two are of special import to the Orthodox Jews, while with those who have accepted the modern, or reform dispensation, the first and the last day are the only ones observed.

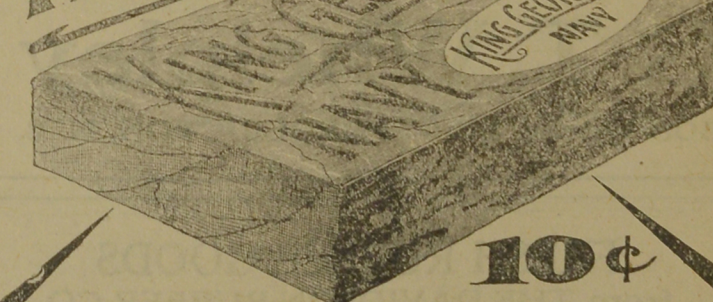
The Passover, which is also known as the Feast of the Unleavened Bread, was instituted to commemorate the departure of the Children of Israel from Egypt, under the leadership of Moses, where they had been held in bondage for upward of 400 years. There are many ancient customs observed by the Jewish people in connection with the Passover. The chief feature of the celebration, however, is the substitution of matzos, or unleavened cakes, prepared for the purpose, for bread in the household of the Orthodox Jews.
