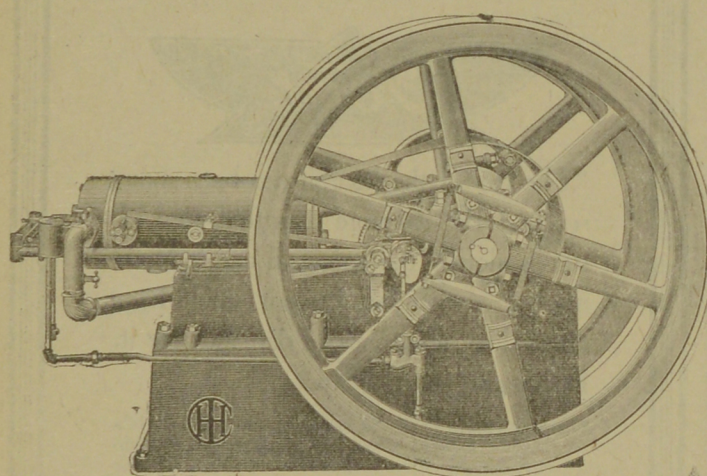

"SMOKEY" JOE WOOD KNOCKED BATTER OUT WITH PITCHED BALL

Byrne of Pittsburg Pirates Struck by Ball—Condition is Regarded as Very Serious

Hot Springs, March 19—Bob Byrne third baseman of the Pittsburg Nationals was struck on the head by a ball pitched by "Smoky" Joe Wood today, knocking unconscious and tonight his condition is regarded as serious. Physicians state it may be several days before they can determine whether he will play ball again. Byrne was at bat in the second exhibition game between Pittsburg and the world's champions when he was hit.

Boston won the game 7 to 2. Pittsburg won the first game of the series. Seven more games will be played.

SIX CLUBS IN TRI-STATE LEAGUE

Harrisburg, Pa. March 20—President Carpenter and the club owners of the new Tri-State Baseball League are to meet here tomorrow to complete all arrangements for the opening of the league's initial season. It has already been decided that the league is to be a six-club organization, embracing Atlantic City, Wilmington, Allentown, York, Trenton and Harrisburg. According to the tentative schedule the season will open April 30 and end on Labor Day.

Peter Sims, a trotter that showed better than 2:12 at the races last summer, was bought for \$2250 last week at the Lackey sale by C. W. Lasell of Whitinsville.

Colonel Franklin, 2:11, one of the late additions to the Murphy stable, won first money in his 12 starts last season. He is a pacer sired by The Bondeman.

A. H. Cosden, of New York, owner of last season's M. and M. winner, Queen Worthy, 2:07, has bought the dam of that mare, The Queen, 2:10, by Chimes. The Queen herself was a heat winner in a former M. and M. and just escaped winning it. She is now nineteen and the dam of four standard performers.

Walnut Hall Farm has booked Silver Shik, 2:08, and four other mares to The Harvester, 2:01.

TO MANAGE ST. LOUIS

Pittsburgh, March 18—Tommy Leach, the former Pirate and now a Cub, will manage the St. Louis team in the newly formed outlaw Federal League, it was announced here today.

RUBE MARQUARD REPORTS

Los Angeles, March 19—Rube Marquard one of the pitchers of the New York Nationals last year, left today for Houston, Tex., where he will join the team. He was accompanied by his wife, formerly Blossom Seeley, the actress whom he married in San Francisco. With the Marquards went Dick Kinsella, the New York Nationals scout.

DUCHESS OF ARGYLE IS SIXTY FIVE

London, March 19—The bells of St. George's Chapel at Windsor pealed merrily today in celebration of the sixty-fifth anniversary of the Duchess of Argyll, sister of the late King Edward and aunt of the present sovereign. The anniversary also was marked by the customary salute fired in the Longwalk. The Duchess of Argyll, on Princess Louise, as she is familiarly known, was born in Buckingham Palace, March 18, 1848. In 1871 she was married to the Marquis of Lorne, who later succeeded to his father's title of Duke of Argyll.

ATELL KNOCKED KIRK OUT IN THIRD ROUND LAST NIGHT

Abe Trying to Regain Featherweight Title and His Attempt Looks Good at Present

New York, March 19—Abe Atell, former featherweight champion knocked out Ollie Kirk of St. Louis, in the third round of a scheduled ten round bout here tonight.

A terrific left hook to Kirk's chin sent the Westerner staggering to the ropes and a right to the jaw a moment later floored him for nine seconds. Kirk regained his feet in time to suffer further punishment before Referee Sammy Kelly stepped in and stopped the bout.

The fight inaugurated Atell's attempt to regain the featherweight title. Kirk is the man who made him quit in a bout in the west four months ago.

Tonight Atell had all the better of it for two rounds. He jabbed Atell almost at will with the left and hooked his right to the head repeatedly. There was a sudden shift when the third round started, however, Atell stepping in quickly with the deciding blows.

Toronto, March 20—A bench show under the joint auspices of the Kennel Club and the Bulldog Breeders' Association opened at the Armories today and will continue through the remainder of the week. Prize-winning dogs of many breeds and representing well known kennels throughout Canada and the United States are included among the exhibits.

KALAMAZOO TO PUT UP \$26,000 EARLY CLOSING PURSES

Twelve Thousand Put Up For Trotters —Every Heat a Race System to be Tried

Kalamazoo, Mich., March 18—Twenty-six thousand dollars in early closing purses were announced today for the sixth renewal of Kalamazoo's Grand Circuit races, August 4 to 9 inclusive. The two features will be the Paper Mills purse of \$12,000 for 2:14 trotters and the Burdick Hotel purse of \$8,000 for 2:11 pacers.

These two races will be decided on the four-beat plan and each winner will receive a valuable cup in addition to his share of the money.

The system of every heat a race will prevail. The value of each heat in the big trot will be \$3,000, being divided 50, 25, 15 and 10 per cent. The 2:12 pace will be conducted on the same plan, the purse for each heat being \$1,500. In case of a tie in either race, the purse so tied will be required to race a fifth heat to decide the ownership of the cup.

Three other events are included in the early closing card. They are the Michigan United Traction Company's purse, value \$3,000 for 2:10 trotters, the Rickman Hotel purse, value \$2,000 for 2:17 trotters, and the American Hotel purse, value \$3,000 for 2:08 pacers. These three events will be three-on-five heats, to finish with the fifth heat.

MAY QUIT RING

San Francisco, March 18—If Ad Wolgast, former lightweight champion, loses his fight with Tommy Murphy next month he will quit the ring for good.

Tom Jones, Wolgast's manager, made this assertion today in talking over plans for the fight prior to Wolgast's departure for his training camp at Harbin Springs.

MATTY BALDWIN SHOWED CLASS AGAINST EDDIE SMITH

Bout at New York Went Ten Rounds Bostonian Having Shade Better of Opponent

New York, Mar 18—Matty Baldwin, the Boston lightweight, had a shade the better of Eddie Smith, a local lad, in their 10-round bout that was the highlight of the night at Brown's Gym. Smith's awkward style of fighting and leaping left-hand jab bewildered Matty in the early round, but the Bostonian later solved Smith's style and played the midsection with telling left and rights in the final round.

In the first round Smith cut Baldwin's lips with a stiff left, but the Bostonian earned the honors of round by landing a volley of lefts and rights to Smith's stomach near the end of the period.

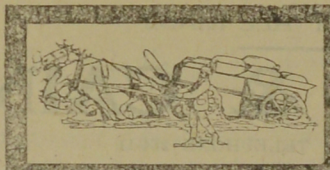

In the final rounds both went in hammer and tongs, Baldwin having a shade the better of the better of it.

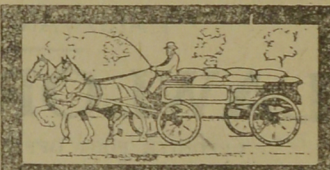
MATCHED AGAIN
