DR. A. J. MURRAY CALLED TO HIS REWARD

Fredericton Junction, N. B., April 3.—Dr. Angus J. Murray passed away at 1 o'clock this afternoon at his residence here after an illness extending over some months.

He had been in poor health for a year, suffering from pulmonary tuberculosis, and had been bedridden since the day before Christmas.

Dr. Murray was born at Loganville Pictou County, Nova Scotia, October 23, 1855, the eldest son of John and Nancy Murray.

He began his medical studies in the Halifax Medical College, now Dalhousie College, passing his primary exams, there in 1874. His health failing, he went west, finally drifting back to Chicago, where in 1883 he graduated from what is now known as the Medical Department of the University of Illinois. Coming east, he began his professional career at Greenwich, Kings County, N. B., and practiced there for five years with great acceptance. In 1887 he was married to Mary S. McKay, daughter of John McKay, Earlton, N. S.

In 1890 the doctor moved to Fredericton Junction. In 1900 his wife died and in 1903 he was married to Miss Minnie E. Mersereau, daughter of Leonard Mersereau, of Fredericton Junction.

Besides his widow he is survived by his mother, two sons, James, of the marine and fisheries department, at Ottawa, and John at home, and two daughters, Miss Anna, at home, and one residing in Nova Scotia. One brother, Dr. Alex. Murray, of Deer Island, Charlotte County also survives.

The doctor was a Conservative in politics and for some years represented the Parish of Gladstone in the municipal council. He was also a member of the provincial board of health.

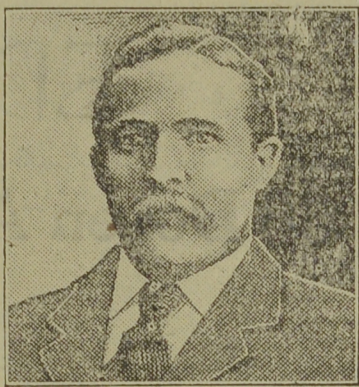

1800—William Cowper, famous English poet, died. Born in 1731.

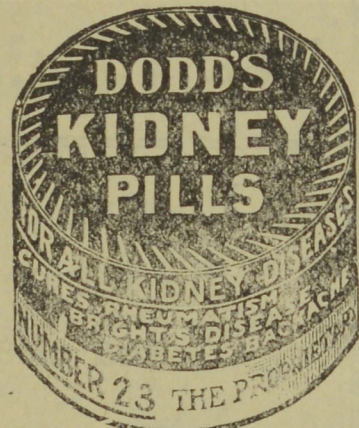

NEWS AND NOTES OF FINANCIAL WORLD

Washington, D. C., April 5.—Occupying first place on the calendar of events for the week will be the assembling of Congress in extraordinary session Monday. The revision of the tariff is the purpose of the session. Radical changes in some of the existing tariff schedules are certain though the multitude and diversity of the interests affected will necessarily make the task a difficult one.

The possibility that the long-expected decisions in the Minnesota and intermountain rate cases may be handed down will serve to attract public attention to the Supreme Court of the United States, when that body reconvenes Monday after a recess of two weeks.

Michigan's election of minor State officials on Monday takes an added importance since the electors will vote at the same time on several proposed constitutional amendments, among them one giving women the right of suffrage and another providing for the initiative, referendum and recall. Detroit will pass upon a charter amendment involving the principle of municipal ownership of public utilities.

State authorities, farmers, bankers and railroad officials are to meet in conference in Chicago, Tuesday to devise simplified methods for the marketing and distributing of food products. The idea is in line with the letter addressed by President Taft to the governors of the different States proposing a farm credit system as a means for reducing the cost of production of food products and resulting in ultimate relief to the consumer from the high cost of living.

Miss Jessie Woodrow Wilson, daughter of President Wilson, is to be a speaker at the national convention of the Young Women's Christian Association, which will meet in Richmond, Va., Wednesday for a session of four days.

The Chinese Assembly will convene Monday. One of its first duties will be to proclaim a new president of the republic. Much will depend upon the proceedings of the assembly in regards to early recognition of the republic by the nations of the world.

The week will see the real beginning of the professional baseball season of 1913. The American and National leagues will start their championship races Thursday. The Southern league, American Association and several other of the minor organizations will get under way the same day.

Other events of the week will include the meeting of the National Drainage Congress in St. Louis, the convention of the Navy League in Washington, the cable chess match between American and English universities, and the dinner of the Gridiron Club, at which President Woodrow Wilson is to be the guest of honor.

DISCUSSING NAVAL BUDGET

Discussing Winston Churchill's Naval budget speech, the Ottawa Citizen of March 28th, says—

"The 'extraordinary demands' made upon the builders in reality limited the amount to be expended for British naval purposes according to Mr. Churchill. This would seem to mean that the Canadian ships might have to be built elsewhere than in Britain, necessitating perhaps the establishment of shipyards in Canada. If this were so, it would quite change the situation, so far, at least, as the Opposition is concerned."

If this were merely the expression of the Ottawa Citizen it would be of little interest. But coming from a journal which is so frequently used as the official mouth piece of the Government one may well ask what its real significance is.

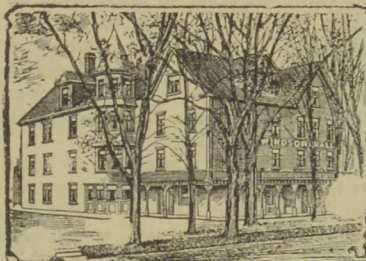
