Pets Won Another Yesterday from St. Croix

Score was 8 to 4---St. John Beat Bangor and Positions of Teams are Unchanged---Yesterday's Game here was Rocky with Some Good Fielding in Spots---New Pitcher Taken out in Third---Dedrich Pitched Good Ball---St. John 7, Bangor 5

The Pets beat St. Croix yesterday 8 to 4 in a game that had some good points and some poor ones. Phelan the new Fredericton pitcher, was tried out and was taken out of the box in the third inning after four hits had been made off him. Dedrich finished the game, allowing only two. Phelan was wild but is expected to improve.

Lee was on the mound for St. Croix. He was as wild as a hawk but the Pets failed to hit him, chalking up only four singles. In the third he covered himself with glory by neatly "beating" Dedrich. The blow on the head hurt the Fredericton pitcher but he gamely kept on playing. In the field both teams were rocky with Keaney and Wildes as chief offenders. An unassisted double play by McPherson was a pleasant relief. The St. Croix shortstop strained himself making this, too.

St. Croix scored first, thus starting in the manner best calculated to get the Pets working well, for they always play better with a score against them. A base on balls, a couple of errors and a single failed to produce a run in the first but in the second both Gross and Lynch scored. Two bases on balls and two hits brought this about. In the third Parker drew a pass and went to third on Vance's hit. A double steal was attempted and an error by Keaney let them get away with it. In the fourth Dedrich passed Lynch, who went to second on an error by Murphy. He stole second and another attempted double steal with an error by Keaney let in the fourth run. For the balance of the game there was nothing startling done by St. Croix.

FREDERICTON'S RUNS.

The Pets got going in the second. Stone was safe on an error by Vance and went to second on the same. White sacrificed him to third and an error by Wildes let him score. In the third Fredericton tied the score. Dedrich was hit by pitcher and Callahan ran for him. Keaney hit to Lynch, who threw Callahan out at second, but Vance's error left Keaney safe. Keaney stole second and took third on a passed ball. Duggan scored him with single. "P. J." stole second and third. Harry Stone drew a base on balls and on a double steal Duggan scored. The Pets did no more damage till the sixth, when they took the lead by scoring twice. Duggan was passed and stole two bases, going to third on a double steal with White, who was passed. Callahan hit to "Red" Wildes, who made a mess of the play and two runs came in. The Pets had a margin of only one run but in the seventh put things on ice by scoring three errors by McPherson and Gross. Ganley's hit and a double steal by Duggan and Stone produced the tallies. In the eighth White fouled out to Lynch. Callahan hit safely. Murphy drove the ball to second base and McPherson pulled off the best play of the day, leaping in the air and getting the ball with a one-handed stab and touching second for an unassisted double play. Unfortunately the play strained him painfully, he having been injured before this season.
