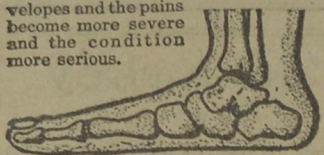
A GOLD STRIKE.

Two men have made \$1,000 a day each, while four others have amassed riches at the rate of only \$800 per 24 hours.

DESERTING WIFE AND
THREE CHILDREN

Edward Suffolk, Foreman for James Corbett & Son at Oromocto has Left for Parts Unknown with Waasis Girl

Edward Suffolk, foreman at Oromocto, for James H. Corbett & Son, Inc., according to advices from that place has deserted his wife and three children and eloped with a young woman named Hayward who belongs to Waasis. Suffolk's family is now at Oromocto. Yesterday steps were taken to raise by public subscription a fund to be used to send the unfortunate wife and her little ones to Pennsylvania where her relatives reside.

The desertion took place a week ago last Friday but for some days the true state of affairs was not realized. Suffolk drew what money was coming to him and also drew money of his own which was on deposit in a local bank and left for parts unknown.

It was learned after his departure that a young woman named Hayward belonging to Waasis had accompanied Suffolk when he left.

The elopement has occasioned considerable surprise in and about Oromocto and also great sympathy for the deserted wife. There is current a report to the effect that Mr. Suffolk's brother is coming from Pennsylvania to take his sister home.

IMPROVEMENTS

AT EXHIBITION

PROPERTY

New Accommodation for Denizens of Midway--Attractions at 1913 Show Better than ever--Arrangement of Building

In addition to the numerous betterments and changes already planned by the management of the Exhibition, another departure has been decided on and this will be in the shape of a structure of lean-to design, which will be erected on the east and west sides of the main building and which will be used by those having outside concessions.

The general appearance of the buildings and grounds will thus be greatly improved, as the new frame structures will do away with the large number of unsightly shacks which have formerly marred the appearance of the grounds and will besides give a more solid looking effect to the building. The building will be partitioned off into concessions and each compartment will be arched in front, giving the whole a symmetrical appearance.

Mr. Judson Barker has commenced with a crew of men on the building operations and the erection of the new offices will be begun at once. The building, which is to be ninety by sixteen feet, will be divided off into eight compartments, ten by sixteen feet, and two eight by ten feet. The two smaller rooms will be used as the secretary and treasurer's private offices. The remaining rooms will be occupied as follows: Office of secretary of Agriculture and Horticulture,
