ROGERSIAN METHODS AS PRACTICED AT OTTAWA

(Toronto Globe)

There is no longer a pretence of fair play in the Parliament of Canada. That the revered Chief of the Liberal party, a statesman of world-wide reputation, where Parliamentary methods have always been most courteous and considerate, should be howled down in the Commons by a mob of opponents after the Speaker had signified that he had the floor is a black, ugly stain upon every man who took part in the infamous affair from Premier Borden down.

But one word of comment was spoken by Sir Wilfrid when by formal resolution of the majority the Speaker's ruling was set aside and Mr. Hazen was given the floor. "Shame!" he said. "That word will be re-echoed wherever men meet to discuss the revolutionary proceedings of the Government. Sir Wilfrid had within the past two weeks given a signal proof of his desire to conduct the affairs of the country with dignity and decorum. He had consented much against the wishes of nineties of his own supporters, to granting with a minimum of discussion a sixth of the supply for the fiscal year. The blocking of supply was perfectly feasible and a quite constitutional method of Parliamentary warfare. At the risk of offending the more ardent of his supporters Sir Wilfrid insisted that the Opposition should facilitate the granting of supply. In return for this

chivalry he has been howled down by a mob led by Messrs. Rogers and Borden.

What object was to be served by forcing Sir Wilfrid to give way to Mr. Hazen, despite the Speaker's ruling that he had the floor, does not clearly appear. Was it intended that Premier Borden's speech should go to the country without a reply from Sir Wilfrid in the same issue of the Press? That seems to be the only explanation which fits the circumstances. And what a ridiculous one it is. The idea that the gagging resolution would be permitted to go through without debate could surely not have been entertained. Before the Parliament of Canada passes under gag law, Sir Wilfrid's voice, and the voices of his followers, from the greatest to the least, will be heard in every possible form of protest against the destruction of the right of free speech. The Tory majority may ride roughshod over the Speaker of its own choice, but it cannot daunt Liberals either in Parliament or out. The hisses that greeted Mr. Borden when he rose to vote that Sir Wilfrid Laurier be not permitted to speak, but that Mr. Hazen be given the floor, are but the first evidences of the storm of protest that will be heard all over Canada when it is learned that the greatest and most courteous of Canada's statesmen was howled down by a yelling mob after the Speaker had urged that he should be heard.

BOUGHT PRETTY GIRL DEALER'S PRICE \$25

That a woman can be bought in Montreal for twenty-five dollars was one of the sensational facts brought to light during the preliminary investigation opened before Judge Lanctot today in the case of Alexander Corosky, and "Mike" Martin of 13a Valise street, two alleged "white slavers" who were arrested by Inspector O'Keefe of the Morality Squad last week.

Constable Joseph Brown of the Morality Squad who made the case was the only witness examined during the morning. Judge Lanctot coming to the conclusion that the policeman's evidence was strong enough to send the two men up for voluntary statement on April 19th. Brown was introduced to Corosky by a friend of the accused. The defence time after time tried to bring out the name of the man who acted as the go-between but each time was overruled by the judge.

Brown according to his own story on the witness stand, told of meeting Corosky in a saloon on St. Lawrence street. After being introduced by a mutual friend, Brown representing himself as the keeper of a dive in Sudbury, Tot., and in Montreal in search of young girls. Corosky offered, so Brown declared, to supply a pretty young woman for a stated price. The offer was accepted, and the girl was to be introduced the next day. Mary Massovitch, a pretty young woman of Polish parentage, was introduced to the constable who suggested that they adjourn to his room on Dumarais street.

Martin, Corosky, the young woman and Brown went to a room rented by the latter at 15 Dumarais street, which is in the heart of the Red light district. Constable Brooks, also was in the room but no objection was entered against his presence.

"Here is your woman, now give me the money," Corosky told Brown, so the latter declared.

Twenty-five dollars in marked bills was paid over to Corosky Inspector O'Keefe entered the trap a minute or so afterwards, searched the accused, and found the money in his possession.

A cigar stub thrown on the lawn of Mrs. M. Bailey's residence caused a slight fire at noon today. Some boys took hold and extinguished the flames.

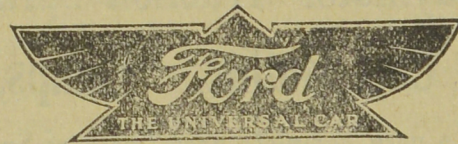
