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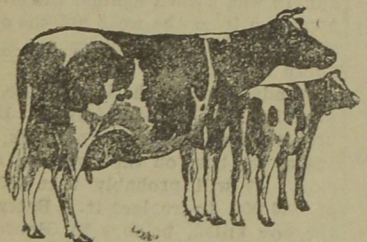

"MAPLE SYRUP" IS OFTEN FAKED TO CHEAT PUBLIC

(Montreal Star)

"This syrup is guaranteed absolutely pure. We hereby agree to pay \$50 to any person who can produce duce satisfactory evidence of adulteration."

A few months ago a can of maple syrup bearing a legend similar to the above came to the office of Dr. J. F. Schnell, professor of chemistry at MacDonald College. The statement interested the professor and interested many others because it was an absolute falsehood.

The alleged maple syrup was not maple product at all, but was composed entirely of foreign matter. If any maple extract was used the quantity was too small to detect by minute analysis. In no way could the syrup have been considered up to the standard set by the Dominion of Canada Inland Revenue Department.

To cap the climax the manufacturers of the syrup whose offer on the outside of the can was so exceedingly munificent neglected entirely to mention their names and place of business.

A TRICK LABEL

This is just one of the trick labels used by the adulterators of maple products and there are many more. This is just one of the analyses completed by Mr. Scott, of the college, revealing in some cases startlingly bold statements on the outside of cans that contained alleged maple product—statements that can have no other object than the leading astray of the unobservant or ignorant consumer.

Another unique can of syrup received at the College was alleged to have been put up expressly for a certain string of grocers. The analysis of this concoction showed no presence of maple product, while upon investigation in Winnipeg, supposedly the headquarters of the company, it was found that the name of the company was fictitious.

Yet another can labelled "Pure Maple Syrup" bore this convincing guarantee of purity: "Syrup contained in this package is guaranteed to be absolutely pure, free from acids, preservatives, and to conform to the Pure Food Law of Canada."

The makers of this cheap compound were prosecuted and fined.

ANOTHER CASE

Another flagrant case has just been looked into and reported upon by the MacDonald College authorities. "Maple Syrup" in bright gold letters is the first thing that strikes the eye on the label. Then comes the statement that the syrup is guaranteed absolutely pure and is direct from the sugar bush. Analysis shows that this sample met the Canadian legal requirements only in regard to moisture contained, and soluble ash, whereas in the total ash and Canadian lead number, it fell far below par.

Other less venturesome dealers in the impure product, resort to other methods to catch the purchaser's eye. One firm has the words "maple" and "syrup" one above the other with the very small but important word "flavor" in between. In reality the syrup is a compound perhaps containing no maple product, but given the maple flavor through the use of hickory bark or the essence of a small southern vegetable called "vetches."

"Some manufacturers use the word 'compound' in an inconspicuous way perhaps featuring a maple bush scene, a maple leaf or some other emblem of the maple grove as trade mark. The unnoticing consumer, the consumer simply after the article the consumer who knew no English or the ignorant consumer unable to read or write, would immediately seize upon the can of syrup as being the product of the sugar maple."

Even the analyses made by the Inland Revenue department are used by the manufacturers of impure food ducts to further their interests. In a recent analysis two out of seven samples of syrup of a certain firm passed the test and were approved

as genuine. Five were condemned as adulterated.

Immediately the company in question sent out a big advertisement. The result of the analysis of the two samples found genuine were shown in detail; the result of the five not genuine samples were disregarded.

FARMER LOSES TRADE

As practically all these syrups mentioned can be sold at two thirds the cost of the genuine article, the farmer with his little hard rock maple grove growing on otherwise unproductive soil is being driven to the wall. The maple tree is no longer a source of revenue to him but an encumbrance. He cuts down his formerly precious hard rock maples, and as this wood is popular for shoe lasts and interior work in buildings, etc., he receives a good price for it. But there is an old proverb, "You can't both eat your cake and have it." The farmer is losing dollars on the deal, the forests which have been recognized by the Conservation Commission as valuable agricultural assets are being swept away and Canada is losing one of her national industries. Outside Canada, practically only Ohio and Vermont figure as producers of maple products.

"There is twice as much maple syrup manufactured in Canada today as is taken from the trees" asserted one prominent maple product producer to a Star representative. "For favoring, coal tar and essence of hickory are as much appreciated by the public as the pure stuff."

Just at present there has been remarkable activity in this city in the maple syrup line. Men are going around with cats selling "this year's maple syrup." As "this year's sap" has not begun to run as yet it looks as if there was a mistake somewhere.

WANT BLACK SUGAR

Even the companies that use maple product in making their compounds demand cheap dark syrup and sugar manufactured in the cheaper and dirtier way. The best maple syrup is light yellow in color. The best sugar is almost white in cakes. The darkness of coloring is caused by dirt and, scorching during the boiling process. An American firm backed by the Standard Oil Company annually demands from this province eight carloads of sugar that is almost black in appearance. It is appreciated for the excellent "flavor" it gives when compounded.

WHY BORDEN CANNOT 'SPRING AN ELECTION

Mr. Borden cannot "spring" an election on the country. If he is forced to consult the people on the navy issue, a course that seems more probable every day, ample notice must be given. No election can be held until the voters' lists are ready.

In the unorganized districts of Ontario there are no voters' list today. The last lists were prepared in September, 1911, and are in force only for twelve months. Now lists will have to be prepared. This covers the largest portion of these ridings: Thunder Bay and Rainy River, West Algoma, East Algoma, Nipissing, a considerable part of Parry Sound, and a smaller part of Muskoka (six in all.) The machinery for preparing these lists is practically the same for a Dominion election and a Provincial election. The only practical difference is that under the Provincial law the Board which nominates the enumerators is a partisan Board appointed by the local government, and under Federal law the Board consists of the local judges. For a Federal election the Provincial law is used in other respects.

These steps have to be taken. After the appointment of enumerators by the Board of Judges they have to post up notices throughout their territory. This will take anywhere from a week to a fortnight. Thirty days must elapse after posting before the lists are made up. After the lists are made up three days must elapse for appeals to add names or strike off. After this has been done a week or ten days will be necessary to get the lists ready for the Returning Officers. Therefore no election can be held for three months.

For the organized portion of Ontario, and for Canada at large, the King's Printer at Ottawa has to print voters' lists. The number of names is about 2,000,000. The re-

J. M. ROBINSON & SONS WEEKLY STOCK MARKET REVIEWS

St. John, April 5—While the market acts very strong, we think it would be as well to take profits on scale up. We have now had a good advance from low prices and this without any reach change for the better in the situation; in other words, the market has advanced more on account of undue pessimism, having driven stocks below their true value, and on a slightly better feeling they have advanced to a more normal basis. The chief buying comes from manipulation operations. There is apparently a strong bull party back of the advance and as long as they do not meet with serious liquidation they will put the market up. Holders of stocks so far seem content to hold and they cannot be blamed as the investment return on sound issues is most attractive. We will have a great deal of talk of tariff and while as yet, Wilson is practically an unknown quantity, if we judge the man by his writings to the magazines, he is opposed to capital and trusts.

We expect to see the market advance some further, but think a conservative attitude would be to take profits on the way up with a view of being in a position to take advantage of setbacks.

In commenting on the situation, a leading financial paper published the following:—

"The situation seems to have resolved itself again into a waiting one. We are so near the convening of the coming extra session of Congress that attention and discussion centers largely on the tariff."

There is a tariff more disposition to fear a radical tariff bill than was the case a short time ago. There is also, more hope that the question of currency reform will receive attention.

Next week should be an eventful one. We shall get the government crop report, the Copper Producers' statement and the unfilled orders of the United States Steel Corporation. Besides all this will be given the President's message to the new Congress.

Conditions at the moment remain much in statu quo. There are no special foreign advices. What there are continue encouraging. The position of the Bank of England is better, and a reduction in its maximum rate of discount is likely before long. What the world wants is an official

announcement of peace in the near East. Negotiations to this end are making slowly.

Money is more comfortable, and this is about all that can be said at the moment. Money will not be free so long as gold continues to be hoarded abroad.

The security market is still a trading affair. Every day makes evident that liquidation has been complete, and yet there is not any aggressive buying power, so that anything like sustained strength is out of the question. It is remarked that the recent recovery in security prices has been in spite of, rather than a result of, prevailing conditions.

MONEY

The money market is somewhat easier, the tendency however being quiet and the demand as has been the case for months, is light.

In England the bank statement for the week is considerably better than that for the previous week; in fact, the bank is reported as having made a better showing than expected. It is, however, felt that until the German situation clears the official state of discount will not be reduced and that there will be no really easy money conditions in England, because a large volume of new issues hanging over the market will keep the rates stiff indefinitely.

MONTREAL POWER.

Power shows an advance of fifteen points from the low. While a good many people are looking for an increase in dividend to ten per cent. in May, would only advise buying it on breaks as even on a ten per cent. basis there are other stocks which show a much better return.

DETROIT UNITED.

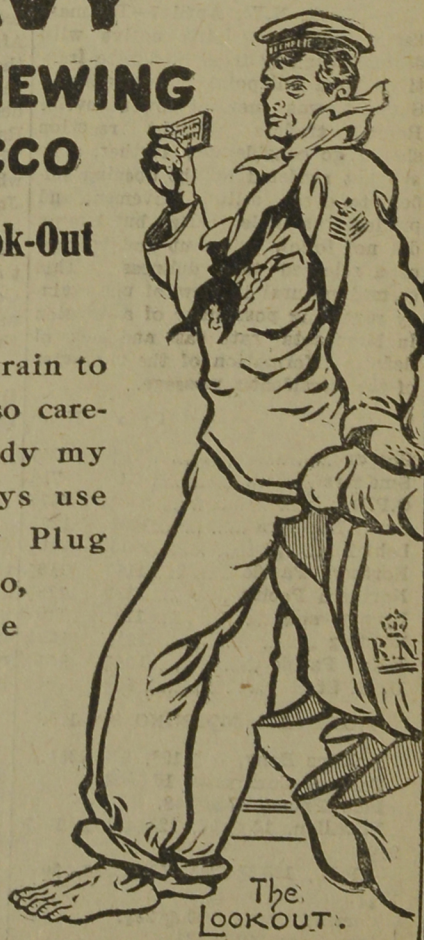
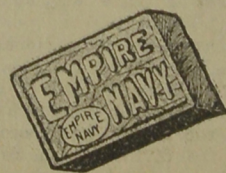
