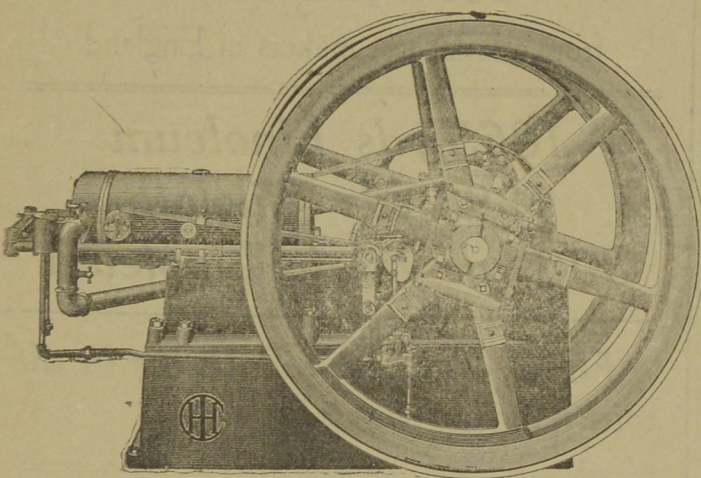

SECURES OPTION ON
BANGOR GROUNDS**

Mayor Hooper of This City Again
Mentioned For Presidency of
N. B. and Maine League

Bangor, March 5—Frank J. Leonard of Lynn, veteran baseball manager, was here today and secured an option on the baseball grounds at Maplewood Park. Leonard says the formation of a baseball team in the Maine and New Brunswick League is practically assured.

The proposed circuit will include St. John and Fredericton, N. B.; Bangor and either Calais and St. Stephen, or Woodstock, N. B. Mayor Hooper of Fredericton is slated for president and D. B. Donald of St. John for secretary.

**McGOVERN GOING SOUTH
WITH MONTREAL TEAM**

McGovern the reliable back-stop of the Marathons last season and one of the dependable mainstays of the team writes to Fred T. Cooke of North End that he has signed with the Montreal team in the Eastern League and would go south with the pitchers and leaving on March 12.

McGovern said that he was feeling in good shape having been at work up to a fortnight ago and expected that his "wing" would be in trim on the southern trip. He said that he had heard nothing of the formation of a league down this way as yet and wondered what was doing in baseball circles here. Speaking of former N. B. and Maine leaguers, he said that Jack Fryer, "Chick" Fraser and Cannon formerly of the Marathons and Black and Perley, formerly with the Woodstock team, had signed with Pittsfield for the coming season.

**COOPER MOST PROMINENT
OF BIG LEAGUE RECRUITS**

Up to date the baseball recruit who has gained the greatest prominence in the spring training camps is Cooper, the outfielder with the Giants at Marlin. That the youngster came out of the Texas League with a batting average of only .270 does not put any restraint even upon John McGraw's enthusiasm.

"He looks better than Tris Speaker did when I first saw him in Little Rock six years ago," says McGraw. "I thought so well of Speaker the first time I saw him that I offered Mike Finn \$5,000 for him. That ought to explain how much I think of this fellow Cooper."

These are utterances of a cold and calculating judge of ball players and Cooper is likely to be tried out to the limit before McGraw will back water on his judgment. However, even a McGraw can make mistakes in sizing up a ball player.

St. Stephen Thistles lost again last night when they went up against Marysville. They saved a shut-out, however, the score being 6 to 1. The visitors deserved better than that too, as they played in form about one hundred per cent. better than they showed against Fredericton Wednesday night. Lowe, who was prevented from playing against Fredericton by illness, was on at point last night and his presence made a big difference in the team.

There was no score the first half. Marysville caged the puck as half time was called and it did not count. The second half was close until about the middle, when the score stood 2 to 1. After that Marysville scored four goals in rapid succession.

Len Inch of Marysville, was referee and was very slack on outside play. In fact, more than one of the Crescents' goals was scored on what looked like offside.

The game was lively at all stages, the St. Stephen forwards skating fast and roughing things up occasionally with Marysville retaliating as a matter of course. Penalties were the lightest of the season however. The ice was soft and rather slushy and made things hard for the players.

Pond was in goal for Marysville and put up a game that surprised his admirers. "Nell" Hovey was played at coverpoint and filled in better than was expected. George Brogan played his usual good game at point and the two Wades and Carl Hovey were prominent among the forwards.

For St. Stephen, Carter, Lee and Barter did the most of the forward play. Hanson at times showed lots of speed.

**EGGS AND BUTTER
EASY IN TORONTO**

Toronto, March 6—The market for eggs and butter at local wholesale houses is rather easy. A fairly large trade has been passing in eggs, but supplies are plentiful and there are lots available outside. Prices are notably unchanged.

Good fresh butter is a scarcity, while a good deal of fodder is coming in. Trade is moderate and merely local. Wholesale houses have fair supplies of stored grass butter or sale. Prices are the same as last week.

The potato market continues weak. A fair trade is passing but offerings are abundant. Rates would recede further if wholesale men did not already have many cars bought up at a relatively high price.

The following are the latest prices Toronto wholesale men are asking of the trade:

Eggs—Cold storage eggs are quoted at 18c to 20c in case lots; fresh eggs are selling at 22c; strictly avel-laid at 23c.

Butter—Latest butter quotations are:
Creamery prints 31c to 32c
da prints 29c to 30c
Dairy prints 25c to 27c
Inferior (bakers) 22c to 23c
Potatoes—Ontario potatoes, 80c per bag; car lots, 70c; New Brunswick, 90c to 95c per bag out of store; 80c in car lots.
